



Missouri National Recreational River at Running Water







Towering high above the treetops and juxtaposed against wide-open blue skies, Mount Rushmore is an impressive tribute to freedom and democracy in America. This awe-inspiring granite sculpture features

60-foot faces of four United States presidents that played an integral role in the birth, expansion, development and preservation of the nation: George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, Theodore Roosevelt and Abraham
Lincoln. Visit the
Lincoln Borglum
Visitor Center and
Museum to peruse
in-depth exhibits and
watch a short film
about the carving
methods used by
sculptor Gutzon
Borglum. More on

DON'T MISS Get a closer look at Mount Rushmore and enjoy a variety of viewpoints along the 0.6-mile **Presidential Trail**, which begins at the Grand View Terrace and loops toward the sculpture.

NEARBY CITIES Keystone: 3.5 miles; Hill City: 9 miles; Custer: 20 miles


on the Scenic Tour of Jewel Cave, a guided expedition of the cave's most impressive rock formations, such as boxwork, flowstone, stalactites, stalagmites, ribbon drapery and more. This popular tour lasts 80 minutes and involves more than 700 stairs, so be sure to dress comfortably.

NEARBY CITIESCuster: 12.5 miles

Located in a scenic ponderosa pine forest, this 1,279-acre park is a peaceful retreat for hiking, bird watching and viewing colorful wildflowers, but its most spectacular sight is deep beneath the surface. Discover **Jewel Cave**, the third-longest cave in the world, which boasts more than 180 miles of mapped passageways as well as illuminated caverns, glittering dogtooth spar crystals, textured "cave popcorn" and ceilings dripping with stalactites. *More on page 42.*

Imagine legendary Lakota warrior Crazy Horse sitting tall atop his spirited horse, arm outstretched as he points to the lands of his people. This image, envisioned by sculptor Korczak Ziolkowski in 1948, is a vision that is still being brought to life today in the Black Hills. When complete, **Crazy Horse** will be the world's largest mountain carving, standing 563 feet high and 641 feet long. *More on page 43*.

browse the collections and exhibits at the Indian Museum of North America and the Native American Educational & Cultural Center at Crazy Horse Memorial. From Edward Curtis' black-and-white photographs to an array of colorful tribal flags to David Humphreys Miller's painted portraits of weathered warriors, these incredible collections provide a glimpse into the history, culture and tradition of North American Indians

NEARBY CITIES Custer: 5 miles; Hill City: 10.5 miles

>> DON'T MISS Stroll along the Fossil Exhibit Trail,

an easy, 0.25-mile boardwalk trail that features fossil replicas and informative exhibits about now-extinct creatures (like threetoed horses and saber-toothed cats) that once called this area home.

NEARBY CITIES

Interior: 1.5 miles; Wall: 7.5 miles; Kadoka: 23 miles





Take in sweeping vistas of otherworldly landscapes and stunning panoramas of vividly colored buttes, pinnacles, spires, and canyons at Badlands National Park. The

244,000-acre park—once known as
Mako Sica (a Lakota phrase meaning "land bad")—features rock formations striped by erosion, revealing multicolored layers of various rock types:

shale (purple and yellow), sand and gravel (tan and gray), iron oxides (red and orange), and volcanic ash (white). While you're here, drive the Badlands Loop State Scenic Byway and

keep your eyes open for an array of wildlife, such as bison, eagles, coyotes, pronghorn and more. *More on* page 120-121.



Step back into the days of the Wild West as you stroll down Main Street in **Historic Deadwood**—an entire town that's been designated as a National Historic

Landmark. This former mining camp boomed during the gold rush of the 1870s, drawing prospectors, outlaws and larger-than-life characters, including Calamity Jane and Wild Bill Hickok. You can still strike it rich in Deadwood at one of the many modern-day gaming halls and casinos. More on pages 44-50.

>> DON'T MISS Delve into the real-life stories of local legends at the **Adams Museum**, where artifacts and exhibits offer fascinating history lessons. Mosey over to the **Old Style Saloon No. 10**, where you can watch a Wild Bill shootout reenactment several times a day between May and October.

NEARBY CITIES Lead: 4.7 miles; Sturgis: 13.5 miles; Spearfish: 15 miles

Experience the rugged beauty of the Wild West, where buffalo still thunder across the earth and graze the open planes. Enjoy pristine

lakes as they mirror the reflections of nearby granite peaks and wide-open skies. It's all waiting for you at **Custer State Park**. Explore its 71,000 acres by hiking, mountain biking, rock climbing, horseback riding, driving along a scenic byway or dropping a fishing line into one of four mountain lakes. Stay nearby in one of the lodges and be sure to check out the exhibits at the new visitor center. More on pages 40-41.

DON'T MISS

Drive along the 18-mile Wildlife Loop Road to see the herd of 1,300 majestic bison, animals that played a vital role in the lives of Native Americans by providing food, clothing and shelter.










Deep beneath the vast expanse of the golden, windswept prairie in western South Dakota is one of the longest and most complex cave systems in the world, a subterranean realm of maze-like passageways, water-carved rock formations and delicate mineral growths. Wind Cave is considered

a sacred place for Native Americans and. in 1903. Theodore Roosevelt signed the bill that created Wind Cave National Park. This park also features more than 30 miles of hiking trails above ground, offering ample opportunities to spot bison, elk and other wildlife roaming freely. More on page 71.





NATIVE AMERICAN NATIONAL AND STATE SCENIC BYWAY

Walk in the historic footsteps of the legendary Yankton, Lower Brule, Crow Creek, Cheyenne River and Standing Rock Sioux tribes on this wonderful scenic byway that stretches from the North Dakota border to the Nebraska line. On the 450-mile route through a landscape largely untouched for centuries, you'll find free-roaming wildlife, mixed-grass prairies, rolling hills and limestone cliffs falling to the mighty Missouri River. And, you'll have the chance to explore vibrant Native cultures still celebrated in South Dakota.

DON'T MISS The Cultural Heritage Center in Pierre, the Akta Lakota Museum in Chamberlain, and the H.V. Johnston Lakota Cultural Center in Eagle Butte all showcase tribal history. At Chamberlain, see a towering new sculpture, "Dignity," which depicts a Native woman draped in a star guilt.



Roads less Traveled


Down the trail less traveled, wonder awaits. Discover the Laura Ingalls Wilder homestead at De Smet; the Casey Tibbs South Dakota Rodeo Museum at Fort Pierre; **Devil's Gluch, where Jesse James jumped across to escape his captors near Garretson**; wild mustangs and the largest concentration of mammoths in the world at Hot Springs; and the Friendship Tower tribute outside Deadwood.

PETER NORBECK NATIONAL SCENIC BYWAY

Among the most impressive scenic drives anywhere on the planet, this Black Hills byway pays tribute to visionary South Dakota Senator and Governor Peter J. Norbeck, who laid it out on horseback. This masterpiece of artistic engineering features spiraling "pigtail" bridges, tunnels that frame the presidential portraits on Mount Rushmore, hairpin curves, and finger-like granite spires that rise from the forest floor. Along the 70-mile route, watch for gurgling brooks, bison, mountain goats, deer and elk.

bon't MISS See the towering Cathedral Spires on the edge of Black Elk Peak—the tallest spot east of the Rockies—and the incomparable Needles Eye, a favorite of rock climbers. Relax at Sylvan Lake, featured in the blockbuster, National Treasure: Book of Secrets.





SPEARFISH CANYON STATE AND NATIONAL FOREST SCENIC BYWAY


There is arguably nowhere as special as Spearfish Canyon. With towering limestone palisades, quaking aspen, cascading waterfalls, babbling brooks and outstanding hiking trails, this is an outdoor lover's paradise. Thrilling leaf-peepers and fly fishermen alike, this singular slice of South Dakota is a world away from your regular day. Take a timeout and savor Savoy, home to the Spearfish Canyon Lodge and the Latchstring Inn, where you can sit on the porch, sip a beverage and listen to a nearby waterfall.

DON'T MISS With bird-watching, wildlife viewing, fishing and picnicking, the trail to Roughlock Falls weaves its way through forests before reaching the state's most picturesque waterfall. Nearby, the new Spearfish Falls Trail spans a creek before revealing another stunning waterfall.

BADLANDS LOOP STATE SCENIC BYWAY

Drive through a moonscape marked by ragged ridgelines, sawtooth spires and native grasslands on this 39-mile, one-hour otherworldly loop amidst one of the most remarkable landscapes on the planet. Watch for bison, pronghorn, prairie dogs and the elusive black-footed ferrets which make their home here. With striations of color best observed at daybreak and dusk, this gorgeous drive sports nearly 17 scenic overlooks, so stop and take a breath and a photo in a place like no other.

DON'T MISS Stop in the Ben Reifel Visitor
Center upon arrival to orient yourself to the
Badlands and have a bite. During non-winter months
ranger talks shed light on this unusual landscape.
Stargazers will find the remoteness of the Badlands
to be heavenly.







OYATE TRAIL

Spanning South Dakota east to west for nearly 400 miles, this alternative to interstate travel takes a southerly route across the state from North Sioux City to Hot Springs. It's sprinkled with cultural and historical sites, expansive settings, farms and ranches, wildlife refuges and national parks. Taken from the Dakota-Lakota language, Oyate Ochanku means "a well traveled road of nations," and motorists will explore sites representing the Lakota Sioux as well as European immigrants.

DON'T MISS From the **Dakota Territorial Museum** at Yankton and **Spirit Mound** near Vermillion to the **Sincangu Heritage Center** on the Rosebud Reservation and the **Wounded Knee Site** on the Pine Ridge Reservation, discover powwows, rodeos and rich history along this route.

CUSTER STATE PARK WILDLIFE LOOP STATE SCENIC BYWAY


Rolling past pine-clad hills, red-walled canyons and rolling grasslands, this 18-mile route through one of the nation's largest state parks unveils a diverse collection of wildlife, including bison herds, elk, deer, pronghorn, dozens of bird species, and the preserve's fabled "begging burros." One drive and you'll understand why this place has served as the backdrop for numerous motion pictures. In spring, watch for cinnamon-colored bison calves. In fall, listen for the bugle of elk and the gobble of wild turkeys.

DON'T MISS Start your adventure at the park's new Visitor Center. Return for the preserve's Buffalo Roundup on September 28, 2018, where wranglers drive one of the country's largest bison herds in a scene straight out of the Old West.



DON'T MISS

Venture to the top of the 80-foot-tall **Nicollet Tower** near Sisseton, where breathtaking views of the Continental Divide, the Coteau des Prairies and the ancient glacial valley can been experienced.



Set out on your own I-90 adventure and touch much of the best that South Dakota has to offer. You'll wind your way through farmsteads in the east before hitting the rolling bluffs of the Mighty Missouri, then climb through ranch country before reaching the beautiful Black Hills. Happy trails!



RAPID CITY


- ▶▶ The gateway to the Black Hills and the City of Presidents, you'll discover statues of every former chief executive manning the street corners.
- ▶▶ Museum of Geology, where natural history lives; Chapel in the Hills is a quiet retreat; and Storybook Island is a kid's free fantasyland.

STURGIS

- ▶▶ The Sturgis Motorcycle Museum & Hall of Fame recounts the history of motorcycling, honors its legends, and sports rare and unusual motorcycles.
- ▶▶ The Old Fort Meade Museum provides a glimpse into the history of one of the oldest frontier outposts in the West.
- ▶▶ Nearby Bear Butte State Park. still sacred to many Native American tribes, presents a chance to hike to its 1,200-foot summit and scan the beauty of the Black Hills.

SPEARFISH

- ▶▶ Placed at the mouth of scenic Spearfish Canyon and home to Black Hills State University, this is among South Dakota's fastest-growing communities.
- **▶▶** DC Booth Historic Fish Hatchery has an underwater viewing area; **High Plains Western Heritage** Center honors Old West pioneers and Native Americans: **Termesphere Gallery** displays artist's sensational rotating, spherical paintings.

I-29 ROAD TRIP

From the western reenactments at Fort Sisseton Historic State Park in the north to the quiet woods of Newton Hills State Park in the south, and hundreds of prairie potholes and lakes in between, this scenic route takes you down the trail less-traveled.



WATERTOWN

Arts and culture, a historic trolley and museums, wineries and distilleries, restaurants and a zoo complete the picture in this northeastern community.

MUST-SEE STOPS

Redlin Art Center features the work of popular painter Terry Redlin; outdoor sculptures on the Watertown Artwalk; the restored 1885 home of the state's first governor at the Mellette House; a sense of history at the Codington County Heritage Museum; get up close and personal with animals at the Bramble Park Zoo; and sample locally produced craft beers, vodka, rum and wine at Dempsey's Brewery, Restaurant & Pub, Watertown Brewing Co., Glacial Lakes Distillery and Watertown Confectionery.





VERMILLION

Home to the state's oldest university and a downtown listed on the National Register of Historic Places, Vermillion is well worth a visit.

MUST-SEE STOPS

University of South Dakota and its sprawling 216-acre campus that hosts the National Music Museum and a renowned collection of some 15,000 instruments; the Oscar Howe Gallery paying tribute to celebrated American Indian artist Oscar Howe; W. H. Over Museum exhibits the collection of a distinguished naturalist; Valiant Vineyards, South Dakota's oldest winery; Austin-Whittemore House Museum, an Italian villa with an extensive art collection; and Spirit Mound, six miles from town, with a curious tie to Lewis and Clark.



SISSETON

Situated amid wooded coulees, rolling grasslands and clear lakes, this town provides access to nearby state parks, recreation areas, and the great outdoors.

MUST-SEE STOPS

Sica Hollow State Park, named for the Dakota word meaning bad or evil, due to the iron-red tinted water which was seen as blood by the Dakota tribe; 32 miles west is Fort Sisseton Historic State Park, established in 1864, and host to a three-day historical festival each June with cavalry and infantry units, a teepee encampment, muzzleloaders and fur traders; Nicollet Tower, provides commanding views of a great valley carved by glaciers some 40,000 years ago.

BROOKINGS

Home to South Dakota State University, this bustling community is replete with parks, nature areas, museums, shopping and outstanding nightlife.

MUST-SEE STOPS

Come face-to-face with an animatronic T. Rex and other engaging exhibits at the Children's Museum of South Dakota; view Brookings and the surrounding prairie from the 165-foot-tall Coughlin Campanile; step back in time at the South Dakota Agricultural Heritage Museum; gaze at more than 7,000 masterful creations at the South Dakota Art Museum; and at nearby Volga, catch the pioneer spirit by viewing more than 4,500 artifacts of a bygone era at the Brookings County History Museum.

HIGHWAY 14 ROAD TRIP

Dating back to 1926, Highway 14 is one of the nation's original highways, traveling east-to-west and allowing motorists to visit vibrant small towns and many worthwhile attractions.



BROOKINGS

Start your trek in this busy community that's home to the state's largest university, a charming downtown historic district, and one of the top children's museums in the country.

MUST-SEE STOPS

McCrory Gardens is home to 70 acres of flowers, trees and grasses; rent a canoe or a fishing rod and explore the 135-acre **Dakota Nature Park**; the **South Dakota Art Museum** contains more than 7,000 works.

DE SMET

Made famous by the *Little House on the Prairie* books and television series, visitors drift back to pioneer life of the 1880s.

▶▶ MUST-SEE STOPS

The Laura Ingalls Wilder Pageant attracts thousands of visitors each July, allowing them a brief return to yesteryear and remembrances of early life on the prairie.




HURON

Surrounded by world-class pheasant hunting opportunities, Huron is also home to Splash Central Waterpark, the South Dakota State Fair, and the world's largest pheasant.

MUST-SEE STOPS

Dakotaland Museum preserves the region's heritage with photographs, maps, memorabilia and a huge display of taxidermy; **Humphrey Drug Store** was once the workplace of VP Hubert H. Humphrey in the 1930s and is still owned by the family today.



PIERRE/FORT PIERRE

At the geographic center of South Dakota sits the state capital, a city on the river that boasts a beautifully preserved capitol building open for tours and a lively downtown. Meanwhile, its sister city across the river—Fort Pierre—retains its history as a strategic outpost for fur traders and Army soldiers.

▶▶ MUST-SEE STOPS

Cultural Heritage Center retraces the state's history; South Dakota Discovery Center is a playground for kids; National Guard Museum preserves military heritage; WWII Memorial tells stories of fallen heroes; and the Casey Tibbs Rodeo Center in Fort Pierre highlights the career of the nine-time World Champion and actor.



POWWOW

Traditional Native American culture comes alive in color, costume, dance and pageantry at powwows conducted throughout South Dakota each vear. Traditional and competitive events include the Black Hills Powwow in Rapid City, the Rosebud Tribal Powwow at Rosebud, the Sioux Empire Wacipi (powwow) in Sioux Falls, and the Yankton Sioux Tribe's Fort Randall Powwow at Lake Andes. Don't miss the Sisseton Wahpeton **Dakota Nation's Annual** Wacipi (powwow), the oldest continual event in the state. Whichever you choose to attend, don't miss the Grand Entry!

South Dakota's storied Native American culture, heritage and traditions are on full display for visitors to the Mount Rushmore State. Get an eyeful and earful of history at these many stops:

Akta Lakota Museum

An outreach of St. Joseph's Indian School in **Chamberlain**, this museum exhibits the rich history of the Lakota, providing travelers with a living lesson on the Native American way of life.

Oglala Lakota College Historical Center

Located on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation southwest of **Kyle**, this center chronicles the history of the Oglala Lakota tribe from the early 1800s to the Wounded Knee Massacre of 1890.

Heritage Center at Red Cloud Indian School

Located on the campus of the Red Cloud Indian School in **Pine Ridge**, this is the spot to explore Lakota and other Native American cultures.

South Dakota Cultural Heritage Center

This Smithsonian affiliate in **Pierre** unveils a wealth of history about Northern Plains


Indians and features colorful Lakota headdresses and other Native American items among its nearly 30,000 artifacts.

Good Earth State Park

Located on the largest Oneota Indian cultural site in the Upper Midwest, this park—a few miles southeast of **Sioux Falls**—served as an important ceremonial site and trading center for tribal people from 1300-1700 A.D.

Bear Butte State Park

This 1,200-foot tall formation is home to trails ranging from easy to challenging and offers a stunning view of **Sturgis** and the Black Hills. Enjoy the scenery but don't disturb the prayer cloths as Bear Butte is still an active place of worship for indigenous Northern Plains tribes.



Stroll down Rapid City's charming Main Street, lined with art galleries, boutiques and gift shops showcasing Native American-made wares and Western artwork. Shop Prairie Edge Trading Co & Galleries, a singular store where you'll find colorful quilts, hand-painted animal skins, buffalo hide drums and a rainbow of beads in all colors and sizes. At Native Americanowned Sage & Silver Americana, browse locally made artwork and stylish Western wear, such as elaborate cowboy boots, turquoise squash blossom necklaces and leather fringed jackets. Just a few minutes down the road, peruse the incredibly intricate handmade vases, lamps and bowls at Sioux Pottery.

Visitor Etiquette

Whether you're a first-time attendee or a veteran of powwows, basic rules of behavior govern these colorful events and show respect for the tribes.

Dress appropriately and forego hats, swimsuits, extremely short skirts, shorts or halter tops and refrain from wearing t-shirts with inappropriate slogans or profanity. Some tribes have dress requirements for those participating in dances open to the public.

Refrain from negative comments or thoughts, pay attention to the master of ceremonies, don't bring alcohol, drugs or firearms, and don't smoke. Always ask permission to photograph dancers in regalia and never shoot photos during prayers, gourd dances or flag songs.



History & Heritage




67 MILLION YEARS AGO

DINOSAURS

Long before man set foot in South Dakota, dinosaurs roamed the land. Today, remnants of these creatures remain and can be experienced at several attractions in the state.

EXPERIENCE IT

From their perches in **Dinosaur Park** on Rapid City's Skyline Drive, life-size concrete dinosaurs survey the community below. At nearby **South Dakota School of Mines and Technology**, the free **Museum of Geology** boasts mounted skeletons of dinosaurs, mammals, marine reptiles and fish, as well as meteorites and fluorescent minerals. The big boys are buried at **The Mammoth Site** in Hot Springs, where the largest concentration of woolly and Columbian mammoths on the planet has been unearthed since a lone tusk was discovered in 1974. And in Hill City, the **Black Hills Institute of Geological Research**, is a leader in paleontological excavations.

LEWIS & CLARK

Intrepid explorers and strange tales have always been integral to the South Dakota story.

EXPERIENCE IT

The Missouri National Recreational River brought Meriwether Lewis and William Clark's Corps of Discovery to present-day South Dakota where, early in their journey, they encountered their first Native American tribes. One tribe told them of 18-inch devils with huge heads that inhabited a prairie hill. Hiking in sweltering heat, Lewis and Clark ascended Spirit Mound and found no miniature devils, but they did spot a massive herd of buffalo grazing in the distance. Pastel-colored cliffs line the shores of Lewis and Clark Lake, where a visitor center near Gavins Point Dam explores the corps' expedition, tribes they encountered, and how a once-raging river was tamed. In opening a window to the West, Lewis and Clark crossed 11 western states, including South Dakota. Today, their 3,700-mile route is marked by the **Lewis** & Clark National Historic Trail.

In **De Smet**, the *Little Town on the Prairie*, various businesses maintain Laura Ingalls Wilder's family homestead and historic buildings, present an annual celebration, and like the **Prairie Village** west of Madison, the **1880 Town** west of Murdo, and the **Prairie Homestead** east of Wall, provides visitors with rich glimpses into the pioneer past. Climb aboard the **1880 Train** at Hill City for an authentic steampowered experience.


WILD WEST

South Dakota is celebrated as the place where the West begins. From tinhorns and outlaws to cattlemen and sheriffs, each played a role in settling the western frontier and developing the legends in whose footsteps you'll walk on a visit to this great state.

EXPERIENCE IT

The Casey Tibbs Rodeo Center in Fort Pierre honors a nine-time World Champion, as well as other top performers, stock contractors, announcers and rodeo clowns. You can still smell the gunpowder during daily shootouts by western reenactors on Deadwood's Historic Main Street, while the town's new Days of '76 Museum pays tribute to one of the PRCA's most successful annual outdoor rodeos ever, and hosts one of the top stagecoach and carriage collections in the nation.







ROUGHLOCK FALLS NATURE AREA

Marvel at the rushing waters at Roughlock Falls near Spearfish. Located in the breathtaking Spearfish Canyon, this gorgeous retreat offers incredible waterfall views and plenty of fishing holes, picnic spots and birding opportunities.

GOOD EARTH STATE PARK AT BLOOD RUN



reservoirs, Stockade Lake, Sheridan Lake, Rapid Creek, French Creek, Spearfish Creek, Spring Creek, and Castle Creek all provide the best locales. Most winters, we're on the ice from December through early March. Fastflowing, spring-fed streams never freeze up, even in the coldest winter months. Since trout are cold-water fish, fly-fishing goes on throughout the season.

GEOCACHING

If the coordinates N 44° 17.849 W 103° 48.471 mean anything to you, you're probably into geocaching. The website *www.geocaching.com* lists hundreds of caches hidden throughout the Black Hills.

GOLFING

Black Hills golf courses twist deep into pine forests, cross rushing trout streams, and open up to distractingly spectacular mountain vistas. Golfers are sure to be on the top of their game on any one of our distinctive golf courses.

HIKING

Whether it's an hour's walk, a day's hike, or a multi-day backpacking excursion, the Black Hills National Forest and the surrounding state and national parks offer nearly 400 miles of nature walks and bonafide hiking systems on about 75 trails. Contact the Black Hills

National Forest office at (605) 673-9200 for trail maps and more information.

HORSEBACK RIDING

Whether you're an old cowhand or a young kid who loves horses, Black Hills outfitters and guest ranches have a horse for you or you can bring your own! Nearly a dozen operators provide guided trail rides and local dude ranches provide days filled with horse activities. There are hundreds of miles to explore on horseback.

PHOTOGRAPHY

Almost any excursion into the Black Hills offers opportunities to view and photograph sensational landscapes and wild animals up close. Mountain goats, bison, bald eagles, prairie dogs, elk, bighorn sheep, wild horses, and many more species call the Black Hills home. You can also enjoy incredible nighttime photography—thanks to our limited light pollution.

ROCK CLIMBING

Whether tackling a few granite spires in the Sylvan Lake district, dancing up well-featured routes of the Rushmore area, or basking in the year-round climbing options of Spearfish Canyon, the Black Hills are a rock climber's paradise. And don't forget to plug some gear on the 835-foot face of Devils Tower. Contact Sylvan Rocks Climbing School & Guide Service for professional instruction.

ROCK HOUNDING

When geology students from across the nation can be found poking around in the Black Hills, you know you are in a rock-rich location. Rock beds are scattered near the towns of Kadoka, Interior, Scenic, and Fairburn.

WATERSPORTS

Many man-made lakes scattered throughout the Black Hills provide boat launching, water-skiing, tubing, sailing, paddleboats, stand-up paddle boarding, canoeing, kayaking, wind-surfing, cliff-jumping, swimming and even scuba diving.

SKIING & SNOWBOARDING

Moderate elevations and temperatures provide great cross-country skiing throughout the winter and into spring. Best of all, there are hundreds of miles of trails from which to choose, and equipment rental is available at numerous area outfitters.

With the highest vertical drops this side of the Rockies, an average of 200 inches of snow, and stunning scenery, **Terry Peak Ski Area** boasts trails that measure over 20 miles with five chair lifts. The resort, with a summit at

7,076 feet, offers a full slate of services and amenities including lessons and equipment rental, and is equipped to manufacture snow.


SNOWMOBILING

The Black Hills are a winter heaven with more than 350 miles of super groomed trails and 1.3 million acres of national forest lands. Detailed trail maps and markers make a day of exploring fun and safe for all skill levels. The trail system opens December 15 and runs through March 31.

SNOWSHOEING

Snowshoeing is a great way to explore the wintertime beauty of the Black Hills backcountry, but doesn't require the expertise or expense of skiing or snowmobiling. COME TO THE CENTER IN

BELLE FOURCHE

This beautifully situated town touts its status as the "Geographic Center of the Nation."

A granite monument in a riverside park behind the Center of the Nation Visitor Center marks the town's proximity to the geographic center of the nation's 50 states. But historically, the community can be described as the Center of Cowboy Country—the rail hub where the great cattle herds of the Northern Plains were gathered and shipped east back in the heyday of the open range. That wild and free era drew to a close with the last big cattle roundup in the West, which occurred in Belle Fourche in 1902.

The fencing of the range changed the nature of ranching, but it did not diminish its importance. The town remains a supply center for the vast livestock ranges in the surrounding tri-state area. As you mingle with local shoppers along the downtown streets or join the crowds at a local rodeo, remember: the cowboys are real and the area's rural Western culture is vibrant.

That culture is on full display during the **Black Hills Roundup**, one of the nation's premier rodeo events, held annually over the Fourth of July weekend at the

Belle Fourche rodeo grounds. The grounds host numerous local, regional, and national rodeos throughout the summer.

You can visit two bucking brothers, rodeo greats Marvin and Mark Garrett, as you stroll downtown Belle Fourche. Statues of each, bucking high on a rank bronc, stand on opposite corners. The artist is Tony Chytka, an area rancher and former rodeo bull riding champ himself.

A visit to the **Tri-State Museum**—located at 415 Fifth Avenue and in the same facility as the visitor center—gives vacationers a great overview of that heritage and early settlement in the corners of South Dakota, Montana, and Wyoming.

After viewing the exhibits and browsing through the gift shop, go out back to the deck and down to the park where a 21-foot-diameter compass rose commemorates Belle Fourche as the Geographic Center of the Nation. •



WHERE IT ALL COMES TOGETHER

Both outdoor adventurers and art lovers are apt to amble through Custer on their way to enjoying their favorite activities.

Custer, the oldest town in the Black Hills, has gained a name for itself with its picturesque downtown and close proximity to unique attractions. Then there's the town's appealing setting – a landscape studded with granite outcroppings and surrounded by Ponderosa pines. With numerous hotels/motels, B&B's, campgrounds, restaurants, and attractions, Custer makes an ideal base camp for exploring all that the Hills have to offer.

Named for General George Armstrong Custer, the area first appeared on a map in 1874 when Custer brought a large expeditionary force into the Black Hills to scout this unknown wilderness. The news of a gold discovery near today's downtown Custer touched off the last big gold rush in the continental United States. In 2018, July 20–22 will mark the 95th annual celebration of Gold Discovery Days in Custer.

ATTRACTIONS


A vestige of Custer's history is Gordon Stockade, located


only a few minutes east of town on Hwy 16A. The meticulously restored log enclosure, with cabins inside, was originally built in 1874 by John Gordon and his party of gold seekers.

The stockade sits at the entrance to the 71,000-acre Custer State Park, the crown jewel of South Dakota's park system. All within a 30-minute drive of Custer are Mount Rushmore National Memorial, Crazy Horse Memorial, Jewel Cave National Monument, and Wind Cave National Park. There's also access to the 109-mile George S. Mickelson Trail.

In town, gather a sense of the historical significance of Custer at the **1881 Courthouse Museum**. This three-floor museum details history from 1874 to present, with exhibits highlighting Native American culture, local wildlife, pioneer life, the 1874 Custer Expedition, and much more.

Just four miles west of Custer. Four Mile Old West Town

Also nearby are the slippery flumes at **Beaver Lake Waterslide**, where the fun is fast – and wet. Then seek out some high adrenaline adventure by booking a bucket-list ride with **Black Hills Balloons**. Their experienced flight team guides visitors high above the untouched wilderness for 360 degree views of the Hills. Back on the ground, the experience is sealed with a traditional champagne toast and first flight certificate. Or take advantage of some of the world's finest rock climbing with the guided climbing service, **Sylvan Rocks Climbing School & Guide Service**.

When evening draws and you're ready to take a break from the beautiful scenery, head to the **Buffalo Ridge**Theater where audiences of all ages will be entertained by a variety of live shows.

Horse enthusiasts will enjoy a trail ride at **Blue Bell Stables** or **Rockin' R Trail Rides**. Both offer unique riding areas and experienced, knowledgeable guides.

WINE & DINE

Custer is home to a large selection of dining options. For a savory meal, visit the **Buglin' Bull Restaurant & Sports Bar** where they offer up a wide variety of favorites and a huge selection of wines and micro-brews. Nearby, the **Begging Burro Mexican Bistro** serves a host of classic Mexican plates and margaritas. If you're looking to fill the individual cravings of everyone in your party, visit the **Custer Corral Family Buffet**.

Get a taste for the local beer scene at the Mt. Rushmore Brewing Company. Featuring 24 rotating taps of Black Hills craft beer, this new brewery specializes in bringing artisan ales and brewery inspired food to the Custer area. If wine is more your style, enjoy a tasting at the Calamity Jane Winery & Mercantile. Then shop their elegant apparel and gift shop, featuring an art gallery and a wide selection of South Dakota made products.



CRAFT BEER

Craft beer has a story. It's written by folks with the passion to start a brewery and the dedication to master the craft. Whether you're a beer aficionado, or just curious to taste what's out there, the emerging micro-breweries of the Black Hills have you covered.

Miner Brewing Company in Hill City is a creation from the owners of award-winning Prairie Berry Winery. The brewery produces craft beers that are traditional in nature, highlighted with local and regional ingredients to make them distinctively "South Dakota." The brewery seats 30 people inside the taproom, with a large beer garden outside for seating an additional 85 people. The atmosphere is complete with live entertainment and friendly service.

Mt. Rushmore Brewing Company, located in downtown Custer, is the newest addition to the Black Hills brewery scene. Their focus is on bringing local, handcrafted artisanal ales and brewery inspired food to the Custer area. Their split-level setup has a taproom on the first floor (featuring a direct-draw tap system of 24 rotating taps) and a full-service restaurant on the second floor.


Sick-N-Twisted Brewing Company serves 18 in-house brews using local ingredients out of Hill City's **Naked Winery**. The relaxing patio and fireplace offer a great venue to enjoy time with friends and family.

The Knuckle Saloon & Brewing Company in downtown Sturgis is also worth sampling during your visit. The Saloon is also a museum filled with antiques and memorabilia from days gone by.

Crow Peak Brewing Company, located in Spearfish, is the region's critically acclaimed microbrewery. Many local restaurants and bars offer this award-winning brewery's beers on-tap, and you will notice a variety of their craft beer available in cans throughout the Hills.

Hay Camp Brewery, inspired by the early history of Rapid City, expanded to a larger downtown location in 2017. Other Rapid City breweries include Firehouse Brewing Company and the Lost Cabin Brewing Company.

Homed inside a remodeled house on Lead's historic Main Street, Dakota Shivers Brewing opened in 2016 and brews a unique selection of craft beers. In Hot Springs, the Hwy 79 Brewery is growing to accommodate the popularity of micro-breweries. •

WILDLIFE LOOP ROAD


The Wildlife Loop Road winds through the prime buffalo range in the southeastern part of the park. The huge

Custer State Park is defined by towering pines, gentle bulls know they have the right of way, and you'll be thrilled with the up-close views of these shaggy beasts as they boldly amble across the road, bringing traffic to a halt. It all makes for one-of-a-kind photos, but use caution and only observe them from a safe distance.

> As you meander along the parkways, chances are good you'll also come upon prairie dogs, white-tailed deer, pronghorn antelope, mountain goats, burros, and elk.

JEWEL CAVE

WITH OVER 192 MILES OF MAPPED PASSAGES, THIS UNDERGROUND WILDERNESS WILL APPEAL TO YOUR DEEPEST CURIOSITIES.

Jewel Cave National Monument was originally discovered in 1900 and was designated as a national monument in 1908. But it wasn't until the late 1950s that the cave's true significance was discovered. Today, Jewel Cave ranks as the third-longest cave in the world.

The Visitor Center is open year-round and offers a variety of daily guided cave tours, including the Scenic Tour and Discovery Tour.

The Scenic Tour is the most popular among visitors and lasts one hour and 20 minutes. The tour is considered moderately strenuous because it journeys up and down a total of 723 stairs. This tour showcases two types of calcite crystals that are considered the "jewels" of the cave, along with stalactites, stalagmites, and a variety of other formations.

The Discovery Tour, which is both handicap and wheel-chair accessible, is a 20-minute interpretive talk with exposure to one of the cave's largest rooms. During this tour, you will see calcite crystals and learn how the cave was formed and discovered.

The Historic Lantern Tour, available June through August, is a fun, yet strenuous tour for ages six and up. To truly set the mood, your Park Ranger will be outfitted in a 1900s uniform, and the only light in the cave will be from the lanterns you and other participants will carry. The half-mile tour lasts about one hour and 45 minutes and includes 600 steep wooden steps.

For those ages 16 and older, the Wild Caving Tour leads guests into the underground on their hands and knees, where they are likely to see rare cave formations. Note that lace-up, lug-soled hiking boots and elbow and kneepads are required for this adventure.

In addition to cave tours, you can also enjoy hiking one of the self-guided surface trails where you are likely to spot local wildlife including white-tailed or mule deer, bighorn sheep, and many diverse birds depending on the season. You may even get a glimpse of an elusive Rocky Mountain elk, as they spend time in the area but are rarely seen. In addition, thousands of bats (nine species) take advantage of Jewel Cave's unique habitat and can occasionally be seen during the warmer months. •

Crazy Horse Memorial is the World's Largest Mountain Carving, in progress. Located in the Southern Black Hills, Crazy Horse Memorial is 17 miles from Mount Rushmore National Memorial and five miles north of Custer.

The dream began in 1939 when Lakota Chief, Henry Standing Bear, asked sculptor, Korczak Ziolkowski, to create a memorial to show that, "...the red man has great heroes, also."

The first blast occurred June 3, 1948, sparking the dream to create a memorial to honor the Indians of North America that would be carried out and completed by the American people. To this day, the Crazy Horse Memorial Foundation does not accept government funding. Work is continued through admission fees and private donations.

Once completed, the Mountain Carving will be 563 feet high and 641 feet long. The face of Crazy Horse stands 87.5 feet high - by comparison, the heads carved at Mount Rushmore are 60 feet high. The continued focus on the Mountain Carving is the hand, shoulder and hair line of Crazy Horse himself and the horse's mane.

Crazy Horse Memorial features the Indian Museum of North America®, the Native American Educational and Cultural Center®, the Sculptor's Studio Home and Workshop, Laughing Water Restaurant, a snack shop and a gift shop. Native American artists feature their work throughout the museum and daily Native American performances are available, in season. The Legends in Light® laser show starts after dark, May 25 - September 30 in 2018.

Crazy Horse Memorial is open year-round and is located between Hill City and Custer on U.S. Highway 16/385. For more information, call (605) 673-4681 or visit their website at crazyhorsememorial.org. •

DEADWOOD

This historic mining camp—built on a rowdy history of gold, gambling, and gunpowder—has taken its notoriety and established itself as South Dakota's entertainment mecca. Deadwood offers the chance to get a little bit wild, make a couple of risky bets (or keep them conservative), and become part of the excitement this small town is known for.

It's the same prospect of riches that lured prospectors and gamblers to Deadwood more than a century ago that continues to draw throngs of visitors today. Add the town's colorful history, coupled with such characters as Wild Bill Hickok, Calamity Jane, and Poker Alice, and you begin to get an idea of the excitement Deadwood possesses.

From its earliest days, people of all stripes and persuasions flocked into the gulch hoping to make their fortune. And for the record, it was the dead trees of the gulch from which Deadwood earned its name.

Today, the tantalizing allure of striking it rich remains. Deadwood's casinos, with popular slot machines and games of live blackjack, poker, keno, and roulette,

provide hours of year-round entertainment for what can be a fairly modest cost.

Deadwood's bets range from pennies to \$1,000, and they are mixed in with a wide variety of restaurants, saloons, retail shops and history throughout town. There are also plenty of musical performances ranging from impersonators to tribute bands, national headline performers to some of the region's most popular live bands.

While you must be 21 to participate in gaming activities, those under 21 are welcome in the casinos as long as they are accompanied by an adult, remain three feet from the slots and tables, do not carry coin cups or payout vouchers, and are off the casino floor by 8 p.m., unless posted otherwise.

Beyond endless gaming possibilities, you'll also find scores of low-cost or free attractions throughout the town of Deadwood. Some of the West's most flamboyant characters now "rest in peace" at Mount Moriah Cemetery, high above Main Street. Along with Wild Bill

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





and Calamity Jane, the graves of Madam Dora DuFran, Potato Creek Johnny, Preacher Smith, Seth Bullock, and Colorado Charlie Utter are located in this historic cemetery.

A stop at Deadwood's interpretive sites gives you an idea of how the town looked when these larger-than-life personalities strode the downtown boardwalks. Those who want to learn more should plan a visit to the **Adams Museum**, with artifacts on display from Deadwood's notorious past, a folk art collection, Lakota bead and quill work, and much more. The **Adams House** is a fascinating tour of a perfectly preserved mayor's home as it stood in 1936. Or stroll through the **Days of '76 Museum**, which highlights the town's annual award-winning rodeo celebration, along with unique western exhibits from the Don Clowser Collection.

For a city-wide tour, board **The Original Deadwood Tour** bus which conveniently loads on Historic Main
Street. Rambunctious driver-guides will tell you the
whole Deadwood saga as you wind through side streets
and make a low-gear climb to Mount Moriah Cemetery.





DEADWOOD'S GLORY ROAD

Luckier than most with its proximity to the Homestake Mine—the nation's most productive gold mine for over 100 years—Deadwood managed to avoid the pitfalls and snares along the glory road for decades. But by the late 1980s, the ride that began as a wild and rowdy

gold-fueled rampage was grinding to a halt. Lady Luck was about to fold up her hand.

As the community leaders surveyed the vacant downtown, the cracked pavements and the dwindling trickle of traffic, the decision was made to deal Deadwood a new hand.

Town promoters succeeded in getting a constitutional


amendment to allow limited-stakes gambling on the ballot, and in November 1989, voters overwhelmingly approved the measure.

That big vote of confidence was based on South Dakota's enthusiasm for protecting and preserving Deadwood's heritage. Events like the Days of '76 Parade and Rodeo, held every July, had kept history alive through good times and bad. Wild Bill Hickok, Calamity Jane and other legendary characters were permanent residents, with their gravestones in Mount Moriah Cemetery, high above Deadwood, an eternal reminder of the town's remarkable place in American history. Proponents of limited stakes gambling promised to dedicate revenue to restoring and preserving this national historic treasure, as well as help fund other worthwhile preservation efforts around the region and state.

With the return of gaming, Deadwood was back on a golden road - ready to make history again. Over the years, revenues from the town's 80 gaming halls have turned Deadwood into a national template on how to restore and rejuvenate towns "with a past." Today, the



community is one of only a handful in America designated a National Historic Landmark.

Wild Bill Days are held in June as a tribute to the man whose stay here helped build the town's fame and fortune. In July, the Days of '76 event spans five days and showcases real-life cowboys, national entertainers, Old West chow, captivating parades, and of course, plenty of rodeo action! In August, pull out your poodle skirts and fuzzy dice for Kool Deadwood Nites—an event that brings thousands of car buffs to town to take part in four days of 50s and 60s music and events. Or stop by for the Deadwood Jam in September, a lively two-day music festival. In late October, watch Deadwood transform into "Deadweird" for an unforgettable Halloween celebration or make plans to warm up in the cooler months with events like the New Year's Eve festivities, Mardi Gras parade, and St. Patrick's Day celebration. •

1.2 MILLION ACRES AWAIT YOU

The Black Hills National Forest boasts of one of the largest motorized trail systems offered in a National Forest. It currently consists of over 3,600 miles of open roads—650 miles are designated for all types of Off Highway Vehicles (OHV)—and includes 21 trailheads.


While this area is rich with attractions and tourist destinations, for many, it's simply the dirt that brings them here. ATV, UTV, and off-road enthusiasts can access and enjoy many thousands of acres by using the Black Hills National Forest Motorized Trail System.

A motorized trail permit is required to use the trail system and can be purchased as either a 7-day or annual pass. Available online with use of a credit card, you can purchase and print a temporary permit and ride right away. Passes are also available for purchase at all Black Hills National Forest Service offices, typically open 8 a.m.-4 p.m. during weekdays.

For additional information about passes and permits, contact the Black Hills Visitor Information Center, conveniently located at I-90, Exit 61, in Rapid City. The Visitor Center is open 7 days a week, year round, from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. and it offers extended summer hours from Memorial Day to Labor Day. •

QUICK FACTS

- In South Dakota, ATV/UTVs are governed by state motorcycle law, and their use is strictly prohibited on the interstate highway system.
- There is no minimum age or license requirement for off-road drivers; however, manufacturer's guidelines should be followed.
- On-the-road drivers need a licensed ATV, must be 14
 years of age or older, must be able to provide proof
 of insurance, and possess a valid driver's license.
- Eye protection is required for ATV/UTV operators on all public roads unless a windshield is in place.
- Helmets are advised for all ATV/UTV operators and riders, and required by law for anyone under 18.
- There are two types of permits available. The 7-day permit costs \$20, while an annual pass is \$25.



MICKELSON TRAIL

A BEAUTIFUL WALK, HIKE & RIDE

Stretching 109 miles from Deadwood in the north to Edgemont in the southwest, the **George S. Mickelson Trail** has become known far and wide for the high-quality bicycling it offers.

If you don't bring your own bicycle, you can rent one (or many) from **DeadWheels Bicycle Rentals** in Deadwood or **Rabbit Bicycles** in Hill City. Both will even drop you off and pick you up along the trail! Bicycle enthusiasts should consider participating in the very first Big Mick and Little Mick treks on June 23, 2018, or in the 21st Annual Mickelson Trail Trek, to be held September 14–16, 2018. Bicyclers of all skill levels are encouraged to participate in these events.

But it isn't only bicyclists that find the trail the perfect outdoor adventure. You can also hike, ride horseback, or cross-country ski the trail. There are many trail rides that take advantage of this gorgeous scenery. Check out **High Country Guest Ranch Trail Rides** near Hill City or **Rockin' R Trail Rides** next to Crazy Horse Memorial.

With a surface of primarily crushed limestone and gravel, the trail currently has 15 trailheads which all offer parking, self-sale trail pass stations (\$4 daily or \$15 annual), vault toilets and tables.


The trail is about 10 feet wide and traverses the full range of what nature in the Black Hills has to offer: prairie, mountains, aspen lined creeks, pine forests, high country meadows and the wildlife that lives in each of these diverse ecosystems.

One day won't be enough time to absorb all of the scenery, so make arrangements to stay at any of the numerous lodging options located along the trail, including **High Country Guest Ranch**, **Mickelson Trail Lodging**, and **Newton Fork Ranch**.

Keep these rules in mind before you hit the trail: dogs must be leashed; motorized vehicles are not allowed; smoking is prohibited; discharging a firearm from or across the trail is not allowed; the trail is closed from dusk to dawn; bicyclists must yield to pedestrians; and, horses have the ultimate right-of-way.

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




HILL CITY

If you are looking for scenic beauty, a bit of culture, and fascinating history all the way back to the prehistoric, be sure to take some time to stroll the streets of Hill City. Nestled in the Black Hills, this idyllic community makes a great addition to any itinerary.

Founded in 1877, in the early years of the gold rush, Hill City found itself on the sidelines as miners headed for the far richer gold strikes in the Northern Hills. Yet its ideal location has allowed Hill City to flourish over the years as a "Heart of the Black Hills" visitor crossroads—a vibrant community surrounded by lakes, plenty of campgrounds, woodsy resorts, marinas, and hiking and biking trails for all to enjoy. The untouched beauty that surrounds the **George S. Mickelson Trail** encourages many visitors to make this their base as they explore not only the trail, but all the additional nearby attractions. Its central location places it in prime proximity to **Mount Rushmore National Memorial**, **Crazy Horse Memorial**, **Custer State Park**, and so much more.

BLACK ELK PEAK

South of Hill City, Black Elk Peak (formerly known as Harney Peak) proudly protrudes from the Black Hills skyline. Though it reaches 7,242 feet, a hike to the top of


Black Elk Peak is moderate and considerable by many skill levels, as the trails are heavily used and don't require any technical climbing skills. Several trails will lead you up to the old lookout tower at the top for a five-state panoramic view. The hike takes about four hours round-trip, but is well worth the time and effort. The most popular route to the top originates at Sylvan Lake and follows Trail #9 along an easy stroll through the pine forest, and becomes more strenuous closer to the summit of Black Elk Peak.

GALLERIES & SHOPS

Downtown Hill City is dotted with an array of galleries and shops, including **The Handbag Store**, which is aptly named for its enormous selection of handbags, wallets, and coin purses. From name brands to new brands, you'll find classic, upscale, and down-to-earth styles.

MUSEUMS & ATTRACTIONS

Surprisingly, this little town of less than 1,000 residents is home to one of the world's most renowned facilities for fossil excavations and preparation. **The Museum at Black Hills Institute** invites you to travel back in time and discover earth's past as they work to decode the ancient language of the Earth through geology, mineralogy and fossils. Hands down, the star of the show is "Stan", the 2nd largest and 2nd most complete T-rex skeleton ever discovered—and he was even found in South Dakota!

After viewing the ferocious T-rex display, you might want to cuddle up to one of the more than 11,000 teddy bears at the nearby **Teddy Bear Town**. This teddy bear museum is home to the Guinness Book of World Records largest collection of teddies on display.

Right next door, you can't miss the huge chair or Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles cleverly carved out of wood at **Jordon Dahl's Chainsaw Art** outdoor gallery. Oftentimes in the summer, Jordan will have his chainsaw fired up and the wood chips flying as he creates another unique carving.

Also in downtown Hill City, the **South Dakota State Railroad Museum** will entice railroad enthusiasts from young to old. With its history and collections from South

Dakota railroads, it is as educational as it is entertaining.

If you hear the whistle of a steam locomotive, the **1880 Train** is getting ready to pull out of the station at Black Hills Central Railroad. Since 1957, visitors and locals alike have enjoyed the scenic two-and-a-half-hour round trip to the nearby town of Keystone. Check their website for "specialty" train-trips that run into the holidays.

On the road to Deerfield Lake, just outside of Hill City you'll discover a few more adventures. Horseback riding is a beautiful way to get back to nature. The **Trail Rides at High Country Guest Ranch** will take you on a journey with a new four-legged friend. Another exploration method is to rent a UTV or a snowmobile in winter time, available at **Mt. Meadow Resort**.

WINE & DINE

In need of a little refreshment after your adventures? Visit **Prairie Berry Winery** to enjoy handcrafted wines made from wild and domestic fruits native to South Dakota. They also provide a tasty menu to choose from as you relax in the vine-covered patio. Located next door is their brewery, **Miner Brewing Company**, where you can enjoy a pint, flight or growler to go. Or spark your passion at **Naked Winery**, featuring wines from Washington and Oregon. In the same location,

This popular meal is a Mexican-based taco salad built with buffalo meat on top of Indian fry bread; a sweetened dough created by the Lakota Sioux.

CASUAL DINING Ask any local where to find the best burger or pizza in the Black Hills and you're sure to receive a passionate response. Nearly every community boasts of their own specialty comfort food —from fried pickles to pheasant poppers, chislic to mashed potato pizza, and meat pocket pasties to buffalo chili. Home-style cooking is our way of life.

SWEET TREATS There's no shortage of the sweet stuff here in the Black Hills. Whether you have a taste for kuchen—our state's official dessert—or prefer ice cream, donuts, truffles, cake, or pie, we've got it all. •



IT'S THE RIGHT TIME FOR

WINE TIME

It may surprise visitors, but South Dakota has a long history of wine making—derived from regional berries and fruits like rhubarb, crab apples, chokecherries, buffalo berries and plums.

Native fruits, along with recently developed grape varieties that thrive in our Northern Plains climate, make for some delectable fine wines produced by local master vintners. The local wine culture continues to gain popularity, with area residents and vacationers alike ever more impressed with the award-winning wines now locally available.


The area's original winery, Hill City's **Prairie Berry Winery**, has been making South Dakota wines for five generations and offers more than 15 grape, fruit and honey wines to taste and purchase. The family originally pioneered near Mound City, where the area's "prairie berries" were turned into fruit wines using "old country" techniques. Prairie Berry's Kitchen offers artisan plates and flat-grill sandwiches.

Naked Winery has three tasting rooms in the Black Hills with facilities in Hill City, Deadwood, and a seasonal location in Custer. The grapes are from Oregon and Washington, but the atmosphere is homegrown. Also located in Custer, **Calamity Jane Winery & Mercantile** provides wine samples along with a gourmet coffee bar.


Belle Joli' Winery is owned and operated by Jackson Winery and Vineyards, established in 2000 near Belle Fourche. The winery's presence now stretches across the northern Black Hills. Their "Sparkling House" (a state-of-the-art facility producing sparkling wine by traditional champagne methods) is at the entrance to Vanocker Canyon near Sturgis.

Local tour operators specializing in wine tours include Black Hills Adventure Tours & Vacation Planning, Black Hills Tours, and Black Hills Open-Top Tours. Learn more about their offerings in the Tour & Transportation Services directory found on pages 134 –135 of this guide.

HOT SPRINGS

Before the arrival of the white man, the Black Hills were known by the surrounding Native American population as a winter sanctuary from the brutal cold and blizzard blasts of the Northern Plains. And, then as now, the area of Hot Springs was particularly prized as the most inviting refuge in the sheltering mountains. For under the surface of this beautiful river valley are numerous hot springs (hence the town's name) that have served to relax and rejuvenate visitors to the area for hundreds of years.

This warm water resource has much to do with how the town developed and the role it serves today, both as a vacation destination and as a growing regional arts mecca, cultural center, and healing retreat.

A HISTORIC RESORT

From its earliest beginnings in the mid-1880s, Hot Springs established itself as a destination for those seeking renewal - physically, mentally and spiritually. Hot Springs has claimed fame as the Black Hills' home for "Wellness Tourism."

Pioneer businessman Frederic Evans was among the first to see the commercial potential in the therapeutic healing waters. In 1890, he erected a building enclosing the largest natural warm-water spring. With a flow rate of nearly 5,000 gallons per minute, **Evans Plunge Mineral Springs** never contains the same water; there's an entire change-over every hour and a half.

Evans also constructed the first, and perhaps most magnificent, of the town's distinctive sandstone edifices – the Evans Hotel – with sandstone from his own quarries. Eventually, Hot Springs built an entire downtown district comprised of more than 35 sandstone structures. In recent years, an array of gift shops, art galleries, restaurants and accommodations have restored the unique downtown interiors.

EVANS PLUNGE MINERAL SPRINGS

Open year-round, Evans Plunge is still a preeminent attraction in Hot Springs, and a nice warm soak in the 87 degree mineral waters is a supreme luxury. Try out



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

everything: the waterslides, fun tubes, Tarzan rings, water basketball, spa tub, steam room, and saunas.

Just past Evans Plunge, be sure to absorb the beauty of Chautauqua Park. This outdoor sanctuary is a prized location for outdoor weddings, family gatherings and community festivals.

ANIMAL HISTORY

Hot Springs is home to **The Mammoth Site**, world famous for the largest concentration of mammoth remains in the world. This American Alliance of Museums (AAM) accredited site is the final resting place for large Columbian and woolly mammoths (61 of them) as well as 87 other animal species that became trapped in a spring-fed sinkhole during the last Ice Age.

At Windcross Conservancy Spanish Mustang Preserve, experience the front lines of a critical battle to save the first horse of America, the Spanish Mustang. Tours are available to take you out among the mares and foals. Also visit the Black Hills Wild Horse Sanctuary where a herd of more than 500 horses runs free on 11,000 acres.

MUSEUMS & GALLERIES

The **Morris Grand Gallery** is housed in a building that once was a theater. Here you can soak in various contemporary and European works, Native American art and artifacts, jewelry, pottery, and minerals, and sculptures in a variety of mediums.

Enjoy a trip down memory lane at **A Museum of Childhood**. This unique toy museum is a great place for children to experience toys of previous generations—many before batteries!

BLUES & GREENS

A short drive south of Hot Springs will lead you to excellent camping and boating opportunities at **Angostura Reservoir and Recreation Area**—which offers crystal clear waters, 36 miles of shoreline, and some of the finest sandy beaches in the state. **Sheps Canyon Recreation Area** is located along the western side of the reservoir and provides great access to the boat ramp and prime shore fishing areas.

Just west of town, squeeze in a round at the **Southern Hills Golf Course**, an award-winning course in one of

the most beautiful settings in the Hills. The golf course also provides an ideal location for weddings and reunions, too.


Back in town, the Union Depot Visitor's Center, located on North River Street, provides the starting point and main artery of the recently completed Freedom Trail. On this trail system, you can stroll along the lush banks of the Fall River, pass by a waterfall and the beautiful Kidney Springs gazebo, and be within view of century-old downtown sandstone buildings. Look up and see the four-story 1893 schoolhouse, now home to the Pioneer Museum in Hot Springs, as well as the lovely grounds of the Veterans Affairs Medical Center, which houses the Battle Mountain Museum.

Hot Springs will host its annual Fall River Hot Air Balloon Festival on August 25–26, 2018. The event includes balloon launches, a night glow, arts and crafts, and more.

A visit to Hot Springs promises to be the culmination of naturally healing waters, relaxing spa services, and invigorating outdoor recreational opportunities. •

WIND CAVE NATIONAL PARK

EXPERIENCE SOME OF THE WORLD'S MOST EXOTIC AND UNUSUAL UNDERGROUND CAVE FORMATIONS

Visitors can explore two worlds at **Wind Cave National Park**: 147 miles of known underground passages and 28,295 acres of above-ground wilderness and wildlife to explore. Currently the sixth-longest cave in the world, the Park was established by Theodore Roosevelt in 1903. It was the eighth national park to be designated and the first one to protect a cave. Named for barometric winds at its entrance, the cave itself is a maze of passages adorned with "boxwork"—a unique formation rarely found elsewhere.

The mixed-grass prairie that visitors see in the park today is one of few remaining in the nation, and is home to native wildlife such as bison, elk, pronghorn, mule deer, coyotes, and prairie dogs. In 1911, the American Bison Society sought locations to establish free roaming bison herds. They selected Wind Cave National Park as one of the first areas where these animals would be returned to the wild. Today, the herd is believed to be one of only four free roaming and genetically pure herds on public lands in North America.

Above ground, Wind Cave offers incredible hiking

opportunities with over 30 miles of trails. Be sure to carry plenty of water with you, and always be prepared to come across large wildlife. Stay a minimum of 25 yards away from bison and elk at all times.

Located 11 miles north of Hot Springs, just west of Highway 385, the Visitor Center is open year round and features interactive exhibits, an educational film, a park store, and a snack area.

The Visitor Center also offers year-round ranger-guided tours, lasting from 60 to 90 minutes. Most tours cost from \$10-\$12 for adults and \$5-\$6 for children/seniors. Children under the age of five are free. Reservations are required for two special summer tours: a two-hour candlelight excursion (must be at least eight years old) and a separate half-day cave crawling tour (must be at least 16 years old).

Evening programs about the park's history, geology, wildlife, and the prairie ecosystem are presented at Elk Mountain Campground during the summer. Inquire at the Visitor Center for more information. •



KEYSTONE

MAKF IT MONUMENTAL

Discover the quaint town of Keystone less than three miles from America's "Shrine of Democracy" — **Mount Rushmore National Memorial**.

The only stoplight in town divides Historic Keystone from its modern retail district, a mile-long stretch along US Highway 16A. While the town is small, it has as much to offer as many towns more than twice its size. With **Mount Rushmore National Memorial** in its "backyard," and lots of choices for shopping, restaurants, and attractions to keep visitors busy for days, Keystone is a vacation crossroads for the region.


A unique way to arrive in Keystone is onboard the **1880 Train**, which takes passengers for hour-long rides along its scenic and historic route between Hill City and Keystone at least twice daily from May-early October. It's easy to spend a few extra hours in Keystone by booking a longer layover. The train travels along the Old Hill City Road following railroad tracks that originally brought supplies to miners and settlers.

Along Old Hill City Road you will also discover the beautiful showroom and studio at **Black Hills Glass Blowers**.

Here you can choose from a large selection of incredible blown glass pieces to take home with you.


Build time into your day to visit all three museums in town, each claiming fascinating pieces of the area's history. The Rushmore Borglum Story focuses on the lifetime work of Gutzon Borglum and his son Lincoln, both sculptors of Mount Rushmore. The National Presidential Wax Museum displays every U.S. president in various scenes from their time in office. The intriguing history of Keystone itself is told at the Keystone Historical Museum. A popular section features memorabilia from Carrie Ingalls of Little House on the Prairie fame, who spent her adult life in Keystone.

Enjoy both history and the outdoors by taking the free self-guided Historic Walking Tour of Keystone. Maps are available at the downtown Visitor Information Center.











After exploring Keystone's history, shop for the perfect souvenir at **Black Hills Souvenirs and Gifts**, the **Keystone Mercantile**, or **Iron Creek Leathers** on the Keystone Boardwalk.

If you're hungry, there are plenty of places to dine. The Powder House Restaurant features a wide variety of options and is famous for its prime rib. Or take the Scenic Chairlift up to the Mountaintop Grille at Rushmore Tramway Adventures. Here you can enjoy a burger or brat while taking in the stunning view of Mount Rushmore and the amazing flower gardens nestled around a waterfall. The Ruby House Restaurant is fashioned after an Old West bordello—serving great food, but without the card tables and gamblers. Right next door is where you can experience the Wild West, complete with "gamblers" in a shoot-out at the Red Garter Saloon. These hilarious gun shows run Monday through Saturday, Memorial Day through mid-September.

Looking to add some adventure to your vacation? They've got that here too! Everyone will enjoy the

wacky course at Holy Terror Mini-Golf—a fun activity for all ages. Then relax with a glass of wine, a gourmet coffee, or a snack at Grapes & Grinds. If you are looking for "high" excitement, Rushmore Tramway Adventures is home to a plethora of exciting activities including: a Scenic Chairlift, the Alpine Slide, a Zipline, and an Aerial Adventure Park where you climb, crawl, and wind through the pine trees. New in 2017, their Pinnacle **Zip Tour** consists of five zip lines that span over a mile. This tour delivers both an adrenaline rush and one-of-akind view of the Black Hills and Mount Rushmore while guests are suspended 400 hundred feet above the ground and moving at speeds up to 30 miles per hour. Black Hills Helicopters also provides exceptional views of Keystone and Mount Rushmore during their exhilarating aerial tours.

If you are seeking refuge from the summer heat, head underground to **Rushmore Cave**—where it's always a refreshing 58 degrees Fahrenheit. This cave also features some of the area's largest stalactite and stalagmite formations and has been offering guided tours for over 90 years. While there, have fun on an interactive 7D ride, a

seated zipline, or take a thrilling ride on the new gravity-driven mountain coaster—all part of **Rush Mountain**Adventure Park.



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


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MOUNT RUSHMORE NATIONAL MEMORIAL

AMERICA'S "SHRINE OF DEMOCRACY"

There are many ways to draw inspiration from one of the nation's most consequential and enduring symbols—Mount Rushmore National Memorial.


A HISTORIC CHALLENGE

Between October 4, 1927, and October 31, 1941, Gutzon Borglum and 400 workers sculpted the colossal faces of U.S. presidents George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, Theodore Roosevelt, and Abraham Lincoln to represent the first 150 years of the great experiment in democracy that is America. But Borglum faced monumental obstacles in pursuit of his dream. Harsh winters and inadequate funding often stalled progress. In fact, **Mount Rushmore National Memorial** stands not only as a rock-solid reminder of our national pride, but as a monument to the patriotism and stubborn determination of a sculptor and the local crew of miners he guided in carving a mountain into one of the wonders of the world.

As is often the case, Borglum's vision was considered

an unrealistic fantasy by many of his contemporaries. Although the original concept of a large sculpture came from the well-respected SD State Historian Doane Robinson in 1923, when Borglum announced plans a few years later to actually begin the monument, the local citizens were not particularly supportive. But by the time the monument was completed, the naysayers' skepticism had been transformed into the wonder and amazement that continues to this day.

At first, everyone is awed by the size of the sculpture. The faces of the four presidents tower 5,500 feet above sea level and are scaled to men who would stand 465 feet tall. Next, visitors see it as a work of art. Borglum's artistic genius is apparent in the placement of the faces, as the sun's passage creates ever-changing shadows that bring mobility and fluidity to the monument.



PLAN YOUR VISIT

Today's visitors come away with a patriotic appreciation as well as a thorough understanding of the monument from its "nuts and bolts" construction methods to its iconic place in America's heritage.

After parking your vehicle (parking fee applies), stop by the Information Center just inside the entrance for times of special cultural events, educational programs, guided walks and Ranger Talks. The award-winning **Mount Rushmore Audio Tour** is available for rent in the audio tour building during the summer season and the Information Center during the off-season. This handheld (wand) tour will transport you back in time as you listen to stories of how the memorial came to be.

Stroll the Avenue of Flags and then view "the faces" on the Grand View Terrace. Elevators and staircases on either side of the terrace lead down to the Lincoln Borglum Museum & Visitor Center as well as the Amphitheater and a bookstore. In the Visitor Center, watch the orientation film which describes the history of the carving process and why Borglum chose the four presidents on display. Special exhibits also feature stories of the workers.

Beautiful forest surroundings welcome visitors along the 0.6-mile Presidential Trail, which offers the closest viewpoints of the faces as the concrete and plank walkway loops through the woods and among the blast fragments at the base of the monument. Tip: Start your walk on the south side. The trail is handicapped accessible to the base of the monument. Along the way, stop by the Lakota, Nakota & Dakota Heritage Village to learn about the culture of the American Indians, indigenous to the Black Hills. A little further down you'll come to 200 steps leading you to the Sculptor's Studio where Borglum's original models of the four presidents, scaled on a 1:12 ratio, are on display. About 70 stairs will take you back up to the terrace.

If all that walking gives you an appetite, **Carvers' Marketplace**, with seating for 300, offers visitors a delicious array of food selections featuring locally grown ingredients—all served with a commanding view of the presidential sculptures. And don't leave without sampling some of Thomas Jefferson's famous vanilla ice cream! Souvenirs, clothing, and Black Hills Gold jewelry can all be found at the **Mount Rushmore Gift Shop**.

LIGHTING CEREMONY

The most spectacular program at Mount Rushmore is the Evening Lighting Ceremony, held in the Amphitheater at 9 p.m. during the summer season. Following a 20-minute film about Mount Rushmore, huge banks of LED lights dramatically reveal the four presidential faces, stark white against the black, starry South Dakota sky. That's when hearts swell with patriotism and a renewed dedication to our nation and its founding principles of democracy, freedom, and the pursuit of happiness.

BEAUTIFUL Byways

DELIGHTFUL DRIVES AWAIT

Among the many gorgeous drives in the Black Hills, two have gained National Scenic Byway status. These roads are famous for their ability to transform an ordinary drive into a sightseeing adventure of wilderness, wildlife, and waterfalls.

The 70-mile Peter Norbeck Scenic Byway is considered one of the most outstanding byways in America. The Needles Highway (SD 87), Iron Mountain Road (US 16A), Horse Thief Lake Road (SD 244), and Sylvan Lake Road (SD 89) make up this oval-shaped route through the most rugged real estate in the Black Hills. Besides well-known Mount Rushmore and Custer State Park, the Byway includes picturesque lakes, impressive granite formations, and six picture-perfect tunnels.



No less spectacular is the Hills' other noted National Scenic Byway: Spearfish Canyon Scenic Byway. Limestone palisades tower to the right and left of Highway 14A as it twists through the 19-mile gorge. Hikers enjoy exploring the side canyons and bicyclists love the wide shoulders and uniform 3% grade.


Other favorite drives include Badlands Loop Scenic Byway (SD 240), US Highway 385 through the Black Hills, and Highway 44, also known as Rimrock Highway, stretching from Rapid City to the junction of US 385.





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LEAD

MILES ABOVE ORDINARY

Looking for adventure-filled, year-round outdoor recreation? Come and play to your heart's content in Lead!

High in the Black Hills, surrounded by Ponderosa pine forests, meandering trout streams, and magnificent mountain meadows, Lead (pronounced "Leed") is one of South Dakota's most memorable communities.

Lead offers some of the Black Hills' most inviting outdoor opportunities. Three trailheads located in town will get you started on the 109-mile **George S. Mickelson Trail**. A short drive down Hwy 14A takes you to the southern entrance of breathtaking Spearfish Canyon and all of its recreational opportunities such as hiking, biking, rock climbing, and more. Other nearby outdoor activities include golfing, fly-fishing, and hunting. During the winter season, Lead also makes a great homebase for thrill seekers spending the day at **Terry Peak Ski Resort** or exploring the area by snowmobile.

Lead is an all-seasons destination. Snowmobile, ATV, and UTV rentals can be found at **M & L ATV Rentals** at **Blackstone Lodge** or at **Trailshead Lodge**. Both entities

also offer beverages for thirsty travelers as well as comfortable accommodations.


Lead's history shows its compelling face as a mining town with the architecture and landmarks to prove it. Its glory days are reflected in historic institutions such as the **Historic Homestake Opera House**. Inside you will discover a vibrant cultural history that endures to this day thanks to enormous restoration and preservation efforts. Walk through the newly installed Interpretive Center Exhibit for an engaging display of the site's past and present. Down the street, the **Black Hills Mining Museum** depicts Lead's gold mining history through numerous exhibits and activities. The town's intriguing history is also on display at the **Sanford Lab Homestake Visitor Center**, which overlooks the majestic Open Cut—a viewable surface mine.

To the backcountry aficionados with a taste for muddy trails, the history buffs desiring a firsthand look into yesteryear, and the weekend warriors looking to make the most of that well deserved break: Lead has what you are looking for. •

LEMMON

THE NORTHERN GEM OF WESTERN SOUTH DAKOTA

North of the Black Hills on the South Dakota border lies the town of Lemmon—a small town with a huge personality. Anyone seeking an authentic South Dakota experience is sure to find it here.

Lemmon is a unique South Dakota experience and a great addition to any itinerary. This full-service community includes parks, campgrounds, tennis courts, a swimming pool, a nine-hole golf course, motels, restaurants, and more.

Founded by George Ed Lemmon in 1906, the community and surrounding areas are steeped in Western history—from the Native Americans' time on the plains to the cowboys that still graze cattle here today.

Within this lively town there are plenty of recreation areas and activities to be found. For outdoor enthusiasts, the nearby Shadehill Recreation Area, nestled on the shores of Shadehill Reservoir, provides 100 miles of shoreline with excellent fishing, hunting, and camping opportunities. The area is rich in upland and big game hunting including pheasant, grouse, deer, and antelope.

Lemmon has recently enjoyed some time in the

spotlight as a result of the 2016 Hollywood production of The Revenant. Starring Leonardo DiCaprio, the movie is based on the story of Hugh Glass, a fur trapper and mountain man who was severely mauled by a bear near Lemmon in the summer of 1823, but managed to survive.

Filled with petrified wood formations and other geological specimens of interest, the Lemmon Petrified Wood Park is the largest petrified wood park in the world. The park fills an entire city block near the heart of the downtown area. Thanks to recent renovations and repairs, it is one of the best manicured rock sculpture parks in the nation. Visitors during the holiday season can experience a beautiful display of lights and decorations.

If you are looking for truly inspiring artwork, the **Kokomo Inn Art Gallery** showcases the work of John Lopez. John is known for his life-size sculptures made from salvaged metal that are on display throughout the country.

HUGH GLASS RENDEZVOUS

The Hugh Glass Rendezvous is an annual festival dedicated to the life-changing experience of the frontier man named Hugh Glass. In 1823, he was attacked and mauled by a grizzly bear near present day Shadehill Reservoir.

The festival invites participants to dress in historical garb, shoot period firearms, throw axes, and partake in any other activities of that time period. In recent years, more than 60 people have gathered to camp on the grounds and hundreds more visit the festival each day.

What makes this rendezvous interesting is that it is held exactly where Hugh Glass was attacked, designated by an on-site monument. While you can visit the monument year round, it is a special sight to visit during the rendezvous. Local sculptor John Lopez personally enjoys the area's history so much that he decided to commemorate the incredible story with a life-size sculpture of the attack, which is on display at the Grand River Museum.


BOSS COWMAN DAYS

Each July, The Boss Cowman Days includes an annual rodeo and celebration of the life of Ed Lemmon. Held



July 12-15, 2018, the event will offer many exciting activities to those who attend. In addition to the rodeo, the town will host a variety of community events including a 3 Club Challenge at the golf course and a 5K Run/Walk on Main Street. The Cowman Parade will take place throughout the downtown district and a local car show will be held north of Lemmon Park. A public ice cream social will round out the weekend.







Surrounding Main Street Square, discover The Sculpture Project, where 21 blocks of granite have been sculpted into an ambitious public work titled, "Passage of Wind and Water."

And with a lengthy roster of year-round special events, there is always a reason to plan a pleasant urban interlude as part of your Black Hills visit.

CITY OF PRESIDENTS

In many ways, Rapid City's downtown renaissance began in 2000 with a project called "The City of Presidents." Playing off the area's proximity to **Mount Rushmore National Memorial**, a number of entrepreneurs decided the downtown location was a good bet for a large-scale presidential sculpture installation. The placement of the project continues to allow visitors to browse fine shops and galleries, enjoy some of the area's best cuisine, and pose for pictures next to their favorite president.

In 2014, an attraction celebrating democracy opened on US Hwy 16 toward Mount Rushmore. **America's Founding Fathers Exhibit** houses a life-size sculpture installation of John Trumbull's iconic "Declaration of Independence" painting.

A REGIONAL HUB

Rapid City itself serves as the medical, transportation, education, and entertainment hub for the Black Hills. If you fly here, you'll arrive at RAP via Delta Airlines, United Airlines, American Airlines, or Allegiant. Driving in, you may arrive via US Interstate 90, the main route used for driving to Rapid City from east-west; arriving from the north or south you may travel via highways US 85, US 385, SD 79 or SD 89.

Rapid City offers a wide range of places to stay with over 4,500 sleeping rooms. Choose from a variety of accommodations including B&Bs, cabins, campgrounds, hotels, and motels. When it comes to dining, Rapid City is home to a diverse restaurant scene with delightful menus to suit any tourist's palate.

HISTORY



fun visitor attractions that you and your kids will enjoy together. Whether you are looking to explore a cavern, escape from a room, get lost in a maze, zoom around in a go-kart, or splash around in an indoor waterpark, Rapid City offers all of these opportunities and more!

Are wildlife and reptiles your style? Venture south of Rapid City on US Hwy 16 to discover **Reptile Gardens**, home to the largest collection of reptiles in the world—as


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


THE BLACK HILLS' HIDDEN JEWEL OF NATURE

"Unique and unparalleled elsewhere in our country." Those were the words used by America's greatest architect, Frank Lloyd Wright, when he visited Spearfish Canyon in September 1935.

Wright's journey through the canyon was made along a particularly rugged trail that followed a railroad track abandoned by the Burlington Railroad. By 1950, the trail had been transformed into a smoothly paved roadway, and today Spearfish Canyon Scenic Byway (US Hwy 14A) offers its spectacular views to the driving public year-round. The byway runs from Spearfish to Cheyenne Crossing, a historic stage stop about eight miles southwest of Lead.

The always enjoyable 19-mile drive either begins or ends in one of the most pleasant examples of small-town USA: the town of Spearfish, nestled in a broad valley on the northern edge of the Black Hills.

Spearfish Canyon has it all - rugged cliffs, sparkling Spearfish Creek, a rich landscape dominated by pine, spruce, aspen and birch stands, and three waterfalls. Hike or drive to Roughlock Falls State Nature Area, a perfect blend of natural beauty and man-made viewing spots. The walkways offer easy access to this wonderland, culminating in the view of Roughlock Falls - a sylvan forest masterpiece.



Emerge yourself in the beauty with a stay at one of the canyon's multiple lodge or cabin accommodations. To experience a historic stay in the Canyon, plan a night or two in a log cabin at either **Rim Rock Lodge**, one of the oldest resorts in the Northern Black Hills, or **Wickiup Village Cabins**, nestled on the banks of Spearfish Creek.

Adventures at Spearfish Canyon Lodge provides you with various ways to explore one of the most scenic areas in the Black Hills. Rent a bicycle, UTV, or in winter weather, a snowmobile. Check their website for packages that include the "adventure" as well as lodging. If you work up an appetite after your explorations, the Latchstring Restaurant serves up delicious meals.

In Spearfish Canyon, opportunities for outdoor recreation, adventure, peaceful reflection, and awe-inspiring views are boundless. •














STURGIS

THERE'S MORE THAN THE RALLY ROAR

The usually quiet town of Sturgis has a big reputation. Nestled between Boulder Canyon and Vanocker Canyon, Sturgis is known for motorcycles, but also offers a rich military history, outdoor adventure, a unique Main Street, and a variety of events throughout the year.

The little town of Sturgis is known worldwide for the annual motorcycle rally that happens the first full week of August. The official dates for the 78th Annual **Sturgis Motorcycle Rally** are August 3-12, 2018, but many venture here to explore the Hills days before or after. Open year-round, the **Sturgis Motorcycle Museum & Hall of Fame** commemorates the history of the Rally. Exhibits feature motorcycle industry history as well as a collection of bikes and memorabilia from "Hall of Fame" bikers.

Speaking of history, the **Old Fort Meade Museum** honors the military men and women who served in the days of the wild west and pays tribute to the town's founding fathers. The museum is located on the original Fort Meade grounds and offers a true step back in time.

Picturesque Vanocker Canyon, located at the southern entrance to Sturgis, is a local's favorite drive—whether by motorcycle or car. Wine enthusiasts will enjoy a tasting at **Belle Joli Winery Sparkling House**—a state-of-the-art facility featuring delicious sparkling wine creations made from their vineyards near Belle Fourche. Relax on their patio, enjoy a bit of the bubbly, and have a light lunch from their creative menu.

Another canyon anchors the northern edge of Sturgis. Boulder Canyon is a beautiful drive that connects Sturgis to Deadwood. If golf is your favorite game, stop along the way to play 18 holes at **Boulder Canyon Golf Club at Apple Springs**. Beautiful, new vacation homes are available for a stay right on the course.

A bit to the north of town you can't miss mystical Bear Butte. Rising 4,426 feet above sea level, Bear Butte State Park offers a visitor center at the base, a couple of primitive campgrounds, and a hiking trail to the top for a view that encompasses three states. Long sacred to the Plains Indians, you'll notice prayer bundles tied to trees

and bushes along the trail. Travelers are asked to stay on the trail, no dogs or horses are allowed and you should respect the prayer bundles from a distance.

Not far from Bear Butte is Fort Meade Recreation Area. Providing almost 7,000 acres of land for public use, the land was a former Military Reservation established in 1878 by the Seventh Cavalry. Camping is allowed at both the Alkali Creek Trailhead and Alkali Creek Horse Camp.

Back in Sturgis, take advantage of the shopping opportunities along the newly improved Main Street. **Old Presideo Traders** features beautiful Native American artwork, jewelry, and gifts. Stroll the sidewalk to discover **The Knuckle Saloon and Brewery**, the **Loud American Roadhouse**, and other dining establishments. Sturgis also offers a variety of lodging options including hotels, motels, and campgrounds—many open year round.

Harley-Davidson Rally Point on Main Street is the starting point to many events, races, and entertainment. During warmer months, weekly concerts, food vendors, and bicycle races are held here.


In addition to the Sturgis Motorcycle Rally, annual events



include: a Volksmarch along the trails in the spring; Wild West Rodeo in June; Sturgis Camaro Rally in June; AMA Sanctioned Sturgis Supermoto Race in mid-September; and the Sturgis Mustang Rally held Labor Day weekend.

Whether you are a die-hard Rally-goer or you simply wish to explore this famous town, Sturgis is a must-see destination in the Black Hills. •

In a varied landscape offering thrilling rides and amazing scenery, it's no wonder hundreds of thousands of riders make the annual pilgrimage to the **Sturgis Motorcycle Rally**. During any other month of the year, the small town of Sturgis is home to just under 6,900 souls. But when the roar of the rally rolls around, the city swells to 500,000 or more.

For all your motorcycle needs, make a stop at **Black Hills Harley-Davidson** in Rapid City and **Indian Motorcycles**of Sturgis. Both locations offer visitors the opportunity

to experience the beautiful Black Hills on the back of a motorcycle with a variety of rentals available.

SCENIC DRIVES

BADLANDS LOOP STATE SCENIC BYWAY
Badlands Loop State Scenic Byway (SD 240) may
only be a little oi' state two-lane road, but this 31-mile
stretch happens to pass through some of the most
amazing buttes, cliffs, and multi-colored spires of
Badlands National Park. This makes Badlands Loop one
of the most recognized in the country and consistently places it on "Top Ten" lists by many media outlets.
Extend your ride by taking Hwy 44 through the Pine
Ridge Indian Reservation. See map on page 28.

BOULDER CANYON The high-walled valley road (US Hwy 14A) between legendary Sturgis and historic Deadwood provides a short, yet sweet, 12-mile ride with niches of colorful autumn views. This can be a



relaxing interlude before an exciting night of Deadwood gaming and dining. Or you can catch Interstate 90 at Exit 30 for a quick jaunt back to your home base.

SPEARFISH CANYON SCENIC BYWAY This 22-mile journey begins at Exit 10 or Exit 14 off Interstate 90 in Spearfish and connects to the mouth of the canyon at the Spearfish Canyon Country Club. From the other end, turn at Cheyenne Crossing outside of Lead, at the intersection of Highway 85. From there, travel 20 miles through some of the most breathtaking scenery you can find in the Black Hills.

PETER NORBECK SCENIC BYWAY The Needles Highway (SD 87), Iron Mountain Road (US 16A), Horse Thief Lake Road (SD 244) and Sylvan Lake Road (SD 89) make up this oval-shaped route through the most rugged real estate in the Black Hills. The Norbeck Byway includes picturesque lakes, towering granite formations, six picture-perfect tunnels, tight hairpin curves, spiral "pigtail" bridges, and the wildlife ranges of Norbeck Wildlife Preserve, Black Elk National Wilderness Area, and Custer State Park. There are many photo stops, picnic areas, climbing rocks, and alpine brooks that add to the fun. Along the route, be prepared to encounter steep grades, sharp curves, and tunnels with height and width restrictions, which all add to the uniqueness and beauty of the Peter Norbeck Scenic Byway.


STURGIS MOTORCYCLE RALLY

The Sturgis Motorcycle Rally is an American motorcycle rally held annually in Sturgis during the first full week of August. It began in 1938 and was originally held for stunts and races, but has since evolved into a gathering of motorcycle enthusiasts from around the world. It is one of the largest motorcycle rallies on the planet, and regularly brings over 500,000 motorcyclists to the Black Hills region each year.

The small town of Sturgis, as well as the surrounding area, become jam packed with campers, bikers, onlookers, and everything in between. Luckily there is more to do than any one person could hope for. The Rally brings vendors and food trucks from around the Midwest to downtown Sturgis. The entire region hosts a plethora of concerts and special events all throughout rally week, as well as some pre- and post-rally events.

The **Sturgis Buffalo Chip**, located five miles east of Sturgis, holds their own lineup of events centered around the Rally. Their schedule includes a concert series, signature races, bike shows, and much more.

The official dates for the 2018 Sturgis Motocycle Rally are August 3–12. As a word to the wise, you should book your accommodations several months in advance if you wish to have guaranteed lodging. •



WALL

THE "WINDOW TO THE WEST"

Perched high on the edge of sunburned cliffs, Wall takes its name from the rugged ramparts that form the north rim of South Dakota's Badlands. It is a "gateway" community to Badlands National Park, offering year-round amenities.

Nestled among the beautiful backdrop of expansive plains and breathtaking views of the Badlands, the town of Wall offers all the expected and plenty of the unexpected. From casual dining at great restaurants to comfortable campgrounds, bed & breakfasts, and motels, you can be certain to enjoy the view through Wall's "Window to the West." You will know when you've reached the city limits when you spot the life-size Brontosaurus dinosaur near I-90, exit 110.

Expect a hearty welcome and small-town friendliness when you visit Wall. With a year-round population of just over 800, the population swells to accommodate its two million annual visitors.

EVENTS

Anytime of year is a good time to visit Wall. The Wall Regional High School Rodeo is held in June; other rodeo activities are scheduled throughout the summer.

The "Wall Celebration" is held in July with activities that include a parade, rodeo, dances and more. "Wall in the Fall" is a fun family festival held in early October that celebrates the changing of seasons, and the "Wall Crawl" is an event held in conjunction with the Sturgis Motorcycle Rally.

ATTRACTIONS

Main Street features the **National Grasslands Visitor Center**, which is a great resource for rock-hounding maps and the various agriculture land uses of the area. Main Street is also where you will find a variety of restaurants, gift shops, and of course, the #1 Roadside Attraction in America: **Wall Drug Store**. What began with a simple marketing idea in the 1930s has since grown to encompass more than 76,000-square-feet of free attractions. Sure to give an entertaining and meaningful experience with world-class aesthetics, there is truly something for everyone at Wall Drug.

SHOPPING



GET OUTSIDE





BADLANDS NATIONAL PARK

A TIMELESS LAND OF WIND, SKY & ROCK

There's a fascination with landscapes composed only from the starkest elements of nature. They speak to the fundamentals of our planet: wind, rock, and sky.

Ready to deepen your appreciation of the very essence of nature? Take a drive through the Badlands of South Dakota. It is desolation at its truest, where you can look for miles and see no sign of civilization. Disconcerting, maybe, but the meadowlark piping in the morning cool and the darting pronghorns seem company enough. There are no obstructions to mar the horizon. And the land unfolds unceasingly until it meets the sky. It is a land close to the sun, replete with some of nature's finest forms.

So much indescribable beauty that more than 160 square miles of it have been reserved for inclusion in our National Park System.

The Badlands will sneak up on you. Even after you enter the gateway to **Badlands National Park**, the monotonous grasslands of the High Plains seem to continue. Stop at the very first scenic overlook you encounter and get out of your car. In a matter of inches, the ocean of prairie transforms into a vast and jumbled wilderness of

impenetrable Badlands. As you make your way through the Park, keep your camera handy for wildlife sightings that may include bison, bighorn sheep, and prairie dogs. Or capture the nighttime sky with an endless sea of stars by taking advantage of the Park's zero light pollution.

Visually, the Badlands are most picturesque early or late in the day when deep shadows define their forms. At first, neither eye nor mind can comprehend because the visual images are totally foreign to any past experiences.

HIKING

If you are thoroughly smitten by the Badlands, hike the Saddle Pass Trail or the Castle Trail. The Fossil Exhibit Trail, a National Scenic Trail, is one of the most heavily used of all park facilities and gives visitors a glimpse into the park's distant past. Note, there is no potable water to be found in the Badlands, so make sure that you carry enough in with you. A hat, sunscreen, and rain gear are also strongly encouraged in case of changing weather.



FOSSIL BEDS

Badlands National Park also preserves the world's greatest fossil beds of animals from the Oligocene Epoch of the Age of Mammals. In prehistory, the area was once much wetter than today, and supported incredible numbers of saber-toothed cats, miniature camels and horses, and even gigantic rhinoceros-like beasts called the titanotheres.

Collecting by visitors became illegal when the area gained national park status in 1939. Prehistoric bones are still being uncovered today by park officials, many of them first reported by park visitors. If you do spot something that looks like a fossil, examine it as much as you want, but leave it as you found it and report it to a ranger at the Ben Reifel Visitor Center at Cedar Pass.

VISITOR CENTER

At the **Ben Reifel Visitor Center**, you can sit back and relax in the 100-seat theater to watch an impressive, professional 22-minute film. Many of the kid-friendly educational exhibits feature interactive components with increasingly difficult skill levels. Colorful photos and life-size models illustrate the geology and paleontology of the Badlands. Another area features a fascinating oral history film by local residents who offer insights into the hardships and joys of life in the Badlands. While there, stop in and shop at the **Badlands Natural History Association** gift shop.

BADLANDS LOOP ROAD

Highway 240, the Badlands Loop Road, is a State Scenic Byway. Anchoring Badlands Loop Road at its intersections with I-90 are the towns of Wall and Kadoka, and Interior is located just south of the Ben Reifel Visitor Center. Each town has numerous motels, restaurants, and service stations, along with small-town Main Streets that are decidedly Western.

MORE TO EXPLORE



SAGE CREEK AREA

For more high adventure, head out into the 64,000-acre Sage Creek Wilderness Area. You may hike just about anywhere in the park, but you must keep your vehicle on the road and leave rocks, animals, and plants as you find them.

In spite of all this, the marvels of Badlands topography are not the region's only claim to fame. It is likely to see eagles and turkey vultures, deer and antelope, and sometimes a wily coyote.

On the western end of the park, Sage Creek Road leads you into the midst of the biggest prairie dog town you've ever seen. In the basin, you can usually spot bison too.

SOUTH UNIT

Since 1976, the National Park
Service and the Oglala Sioux
Tribe have partnered in managing
Badlands National Park. Today,
plans are in place to establish the
park's South Unit as the nation's
first tribal national park. More
information about the South Unit
is available to tourists during the
summer season at the White River
Visitor Center, located 20 miles
south of Scenic on the Pine Ridge
Indian Reservation. Call (605) 4552878 for information.



RELIVE AMERICA'S HISTORY AT

MINUTEMAN MISSILE NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE

Get a first-hand look at once classified nuclear missile sites that are now preserved as a national park.

The deadly drama underlying the Cold War is relived at **Minuteman Missile National Historic Site**, located near Wall, SD, where visitors can see how the end of the world could have begun.


The collection of sites comprise the first national park in the world dedicated to commemorating the events of the Cold War. Two 1960s era Intercontinental Ballistic Missile (ICBM) sites have been preserved for public viewing. Delta-09 is an underground missile silo on the edge of Badlands National Park. It previously held a Minuteman II missile that could send a nuclear weapon to the Soviet Union in just thirty minutes. The Delta-01 control center includes the topside support building and the underground control center capsule.

Today, visitors have the opportunity to enjoy a ranger-

guided tour of the Delta-01 facility; these tours are by reservation only and limited to six people per tour. The tour lasts thirty minutes and begins and ends at the entry gate to the Delta-01 compound. The route proceeds with a walk-through of the grounds and topside support building before descending 31 feet in the original elevator to enter the underground control center.

Open daily, the visitor center is located off Interstate 90 at Exit 131 and features a bookstore and exhibits that allow visitors to explore Minuteman's role in the Cold War. All tours of the Delta-O1 Launch Control Facility require advanced reservations and an amenity fee. Reservations can be made online at www.nps.gov/mimi or by phone at 1-866-601-5129. Self-guided tours are available at Delta-O9 missile silo, located off Interstate 90 at Exit 116.•





A PROUD NORTHERN PLAINS HERITAGE

SIOUX CULTURE

Perhaps more than any other group, the great Lakota Sioux Nation—with striking tipis, fast horses, and richly feathered and beaded clothing—has become the international symbol of America's native people.

In the late 1800s, eastern visitors traveled to Rapid City by train for two reasons: to see the great gold mines of the Black Hills and to witness the authentic Native American lifestyle.

The Lakota Sioux Indian culture is influential throughout South Dakota. You'll see it in our citizens, art, music, media, fashions, jewelry, architecture, and interior design. In fact, that's how our state got its name. "Dakota" means "alliance of friends."

For many visitors, a purchase of Indian goods is a cherished vacation memento. Sioux beadwork and quillwork is the epitome of the art. Other popular products include traditional and silver jewelry, museum quality artifact reproductions, handmade pottery, recorded music, books, paintings, and sculptures.

Uniquely Sioux themes recur in many Lakota paintings

and carvings. You may notice a blending of human images with wild animals, which springs from tradition that all of the Great Spirit's two-leggeds and four-leggeds are related. Other works may depict mystical experiences, ancestral spirits, or illustrate Wankan Tanka's omnipotent guidance. Many Native American artists show their individual creative vision by incorporating both traditional and modern influences.

Indian arts and crafts, particularly beadwork, are going through a modern popular renaissance as many people are finding the fine, hand craftsmanship more to their taste. South Dakota Indian work is mostly made and sold locally.

Sioux Pottery, located in Rapid City, is a large supplier of decorative Indian ceramics. Their lines include molded, "jiggered" and hand thrown pottery—all with Indian motifs of the western plains. The distinctive rainbow coloring and decorative markings on the pottery are added by hand after curing. **Prairie Edge Trading**

Experience the Heartbeat of the Nation Pine Ridge Indian Reservation

The Pine Ridge Indian Reservation is home to the Oglala Lakota Sioux Tribe. The Oglala are one of the seven Lakota tribes of the Great Sioux Nation and were known for their fearsome warrior mentality. The name "Oglala" translates in English to Scatter their Own, which is representative of battle formations and warrior societies. Some historical figures of the tribe include Chiefs Red Cloud and Crazy Horse.



Today, the Oglala Sioux Tribe remains one of the Largest Indian Tribes in America with a membership base of 40,000. Pine Ridge Indian Reservation is located in the South West Corner of South Dakota and spans across three counties. The reservation is approximately 1.6 Million acres, roughly the size of Connecticut. The geography of the land is rolling prairie, rock buttes, pine bluffs, badlands and sand hills with plenty of wide open country and beautiful scenery.

During the summer months Lakota culture is on display for the visiting public. The reservation hosts many pow wows throughout the summer with





Co. & Galleries is another noted gallery in Rapid City where visitors will find crafts and artwork from some of the area's best artisans. Nestled in the Badlands, **Native West Trading Co.** specializes in contemporary and traditional arts and crafts from local Lakota artists.

A beautiful one-hour drive from Hot Springs, **The Heritage Center at Red Cloud Indian School** is open year-round and offers free admission to one of the most impressive collections of historic and contemporary Native American art in the country. The on-site gift shop, which buys directly from and works to support local artisans, offers a tremendous variety of authentic Native American art. Also, be sure to visit The Heritage Center during their world-renowned art show, available each summer from June through August. In 2018, the art show will celebrate its 50th anniversary, including a special celebration and gallery opening on Saturday, June 2, 2018. To learn more, call (605) 867-5491 or visit www. redcloudschool.org/artshow.

Native American made products and artwork can also be found and purchased throughout the visitor complex at **Crazy Horse Memorial**. Oftentimes you can watch live artist demonstrations ranging from jewelry making to traditional dancing.


The **Oglala Lakota College Historical Center** allows visitors to gain a deeper understanding of the Lakota way of life. Photography, artwork displays, and an audiotape depict the struggles endured by Native Americans from the early 1800s to the Wounded Knee Massacre in 1890.

PINE RIDGE INDIAN RESERVATION

You will find a rich Native American culture on the **Pine Ridge Indian Reservation**, where people celebrate their music, dance, and traditions including numerous community powwows. Also known as "wacipi" or "people's dance," powwows are a good way to get to know the Native American people. Nearly every reservation community holds a powwow during the summer—many at which visitors are welcome to attend.

You can learn more about the area at the **Pine Ridge Chamber of Commerce**, located just west of Kyle, SD.

Here you'll find expert advice as well as a unique rare wildlife exhibit, traditional and contemporary art displays, and Native American artifacts.•

THE I-90 CORRIDOR

It's one of the first and best moments of the trip—when you pull past the final stoplight, with a tankful of gas and a bag of your favorite snacks, and hit the open road!

And if you are traveling Interstate 90 between Minnesota and Wyoming, there are 410 miles of South Dakota freedom, fun, and excitement ahead of you.

SIOUX FALLS

Sioux Falls is South Dakota's largest city, a prairie metropolis with a reputation for fine eating and great shopping. Star attractions are the waterfalls of the Big Sioux River at Falls Park and the Great Plains Zoo.

MITCHELL

Seventy miles west from Sioux Falls on I-90 is Mitchell, home of the world-famous "Corn Palace." It's a stunning, whimsical civic center, decorated inside and out with more 275,000 colorful ears of corn. With recent renovations—larger exterior murals, a new sign, custom-designed light-up domes, a walk-out balcony, and a beautiful Oscar Howe exhibit space—visitors are sure to have a one-of-a-kind exp-EAR-ience!

MISSOURI RIVER

It's quite a sight when you hit the Missouri River. From the east bank bluffs, there's an expansive view of both the Great Plains and the Great Lakes of South Dakota.

Stop by the Lewis & Clark Information Center in Chamberlain. It's part of the interstate rest area and welcome center overlooking the Missouri River at I-90, Exit 263. Admire the remarkable "Dignity" sculpture which was installed in 2016.

On the western side of the Missouri River, take advantage of the 5¢ coffee and a savory meal at **Al's Oasis**, the biggest watering hole along I-90.

MURDO

Murdo epitomizes small-town USA with its friendly citizens, comfortable accommodations, and home-style dining options. Be sure to visit the **Pioneer Auto Show & Prairie Town**, where chances are you will be personally welcomed to South Dakota by owner/collector Dave

many advantages to offer I-90 travelers such as reasonable rates and easy access to visitor services. Motels include H&H El Centro, Budget Host, West Motel, Lakota Lodge, Wagon Wheel Motel and America's Best Value. You can camp at the Kadoka Kampground. Local restaurants serving the area are Club 27 Steak House, Soul Food, Subway, Sunset Grill and Miss Jean's Pizza.

Spend some time exploring our area. The Badlands Petrified Gardens at Exit 152 is a unique outdoor display of petrified wood and prehistoric fossils. The Depot Museum located at the south end of Main St., tells the story of Kadoka's beginning as a railroad town in 1906. A drive south on SD Hwy 73 provides a scenic view of the beautiful badlands basin and surrounding ranch land. Incredible Metals, a metal art studio, is on Hwy 73, 14 miles south of Kadoka. Farther south you can turn west on Hwy 44 for a drive through the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation.

Relax at the city's swimming pool, have a picnic in the park or play a round of golf on our unique sand green golf course. On our main street, you will find the City Bar & Liquor Store, grocery store, post office, bank, vet clinic, hardware store, meat locker, flower shop, library, hair salon, clothing store, home decor shop, courthouse and school. You will be greeted by lots of friendly folks too. For your fuel and convenience store needs, you will find Discount Fuel and Kadoka Gas & Go at Exit 150 and Badlands Travel Stop at Exit 152.





Geisler. His museum has a nostalgic display of 300 vintage cars, trucks, motorcycles, and tractors. In an adjacent space, you'll find delicious dishes at **The Covered Wagon Cafe**.

Only 22 miles to the west of Murdo, you can explore more than 30 authentically furnished pioneer buildings at **South Dakota's Original 1880 Town**.

KADOKA

You will start getting first glimpses of Badlands formations near the town of Kadoka (Exits 150 and 152). Kadoka is home to **Badlands Petrified Gardens**, an extensive exhibit of fossils, petrified wood and minerals that have been found in the area.

If you're looking to take home some authentic South Dakota spirits, stop in to the rustic tasting room at **Badlands Distillery, LLC**. This family-owned operation utilizes locally grown ingredients—everything from corn, honey, and jalapeños—to create a fine line of spirits.

Kadoka also offers lodging and some unique hometown eateries which makes it a suitable base camp for those planning to spend a day or more exploring the area along with nearby Badlands National Park.

BADLANDS REGION

Exit 131 is where westbound travelers exit I-90 to tour the Badlands. You'll find two interesting attractions along Hwy. 240. Firstly, the visitor center for **Minuteman Missile National Historic Site** is located directly northwest of exit 131. You can read more about this intriguing site on page 122. Secondly, **Prairie Homestead** is one of very few original sod houses still remaining in the USA. Because timber was so scarce on the Great Plains, settlers improvised by stacking blocks of sod they cut from the prairie grasslands to create walls.

Entering the National Park's east gate, Badlands Loop Road (SD 240) is a State Scenic Byway and rejoins I-90 at Exit 110. All along the route, expect to find a plethora of scenic overlooks, photo opportunities, nature trails, and wildlife sightings. To take in the full effect, consider an exhilarating aerial tour from **Badlands Helicopters**—complete with a brand new facility and helipad.

INTERIOR

Dating back to the 1880s, Interior is the oldest Badlands town and sits just outside the south gate of the Park. It's home to the **Native West Trading Company** and premier agate beds for rock hunters, as well as modern conveniences and award-winning food at **Cowboy Corner**. Seasonal accommodations can be found nearby, as well as family fun at **Hurley Butte Horseback**. •



Devils Tower National Monument, a unique and striking geologic wonder steeped in Indian legend, is a modern day national park and rock climbers' challenge.

A SACRED HISTORY


Two geologic features protrude out of the rolling prairie that surrounds the Black Hills region. Both of the sites are considered sacred places to the Lakota and other tribes that have a connection to the Black Hills and surrounding area.

One Lakota legend connects the two sites, Devils Tower in Wyoming and Bear Butte in South Dakota. It tells of two Sioux boys who wandered far from their village. Mato the bear, a huge creature with claws the size of tipi poles, spotted them and wanted to eat them for breakfast. He was almost upon them when the boys prayed to Wakan Tanka, the Creator, to help them. They rose up on a huge rock, while Mato tried to get up from every side, leaving huge scratch marks as he did. Finally, he sauntered off, disappointed and discouraged.

The bear came to rest northeast of the Black Hills, becoming what is now known as Bear Butte. Wanblee, the eagle, helped the boys off the rock and back to their village. At the Devils Tower Visitor Center, a painting depicting the Cheyenne legend hangs over the fireplace. Today, these landmarks are national treasures, and each retains spiritual significance to the region's Native American tribes. Visitors can easily visit both during a day's journey in the Northern Hills.

SEE & DO

The drive through the Belle Fourche River Valley is particularly beautiful, no matter the season. As one approaches the town of Hulett, glimpses of Devils Tower come tantalizingly into view. Larger and larger it looms,



until the dramatic pillar, rising 1,267 feet above the surrounding terrain, fills the horizon. The two-square-mile park surrounding the tower was proclaimed the nation's first national monument by President Theodore Roosevelt in 1906. Walking around the base is a great hike in any season. The one-hour Tower Trail around the base is self-guided and offers close-up views of the forest and wildlife, not to mention spectacular views of the Tower itself. The Red Beds Trail covers a much wider three-mile loop around the Tower and provides

breathtaking views of the surrounding plains.

Devils Tower is about 1,000 feet in diameter at the bottom and 275 feet at the top. Hundreds of parallel cracks divide the stone pillar into large hexagonal columns, making it one of the finest traditional crack climbing areas in North America. If you are interested in climbing "The Tower," but would like a professional guide to lead the route, contact the experts at **Sylvan Rocks Climbing School & Guide Service**. All persons planning to climb or scramble above the boulder field are required to register at the Ranger Station. •

BLACK HILLS OF WYOMING

OLD WEST MUSEUMS, ROLLING HILLS & FRIENDLY FOLKS

There is a lot to be discovered in the Black Hills of Wyoming. Skirting the western edge of the Black Hills is **Weston County**—which offers two scenic tours to include in your travel. The "Prairie to the Pines Loop" out of Upton and the "Beaver Creek Loop" out of **Newcastle** will give you a new appreciation of the history and wide-open spaces the pioneers settled long ago. A cruise along the 78-mile Wyoming Black Hills Scenic Byway is anchored by the city of Newcastle and sprawls northward to **Sundance** and further on to **Devils Tower National Monument**. A nice side trip would include the free museum in Upton, WY, via Hwy 16/116 North.

Once in Crook County, you're in **Devils Tower Country**. The mystery and magnificence of this area is impressive. It's where the "Sundance Kid" got his name. Learn about his story and many others at Sundance's **Crook County Museum**, which is soon to find a new home in "Old Stoney," a historic sandstone schoolhouse. Download the GPS guided tour or meet the Old West characters in person as you stroll along the wide streets of Sundance on a "Sip and Walk" tour. Lunch or dinner at **The Longhorn Saloon and Grill** is a sure way to meet many of the locals. There are a few hotels in town as



well as **Bearlodge Mountain Resort** where the deer and the antelope play in the meadow outside your door. At Devils Tower National Monument you can camp at **Devils Tower KOA**, shop at **Devils Tower Trading Post**, and admire guilts, eat, and party at **Devils Tower Gulch**.


Just nine miles past Devils Tower, on Hwy 24 North, is the Old West oasis that is Hulett—offering dining, a museum, and lodging. A little further down the road, in a rugged gulch, is the **Diamond Bar 7 Guest Ranch**. This is your opportunity to view the Bear Lodge Mountains on horseback. While you're in the area, a must-stop is also the Aladdin General Store in the tiny town of Aladdin—population 15! Closer to the South Dakota state line, a variety of lodging and camping can be found at **JC Stage Stop B&B Resort**. Jump back in time at the **Vore Buffalo Jump**, just off I-90 near Beulah. This ancient sinkhole was used by Plains Indian tribes to hunt buffalo.

Wyoming's Black Hills are truly a "hidden treasure" and a great alternative to those seeking to step out of the daily grind and into nature. •

I work with my family at the Ingalls Homestead just outside De Smet. Laura Ingalls Wilder, author of the Little House books.

lived here as teenager and her family homesteaded this land. We've been helping visitors have fun and make memories, while sneaking in some learning about Laura Ingalls Wilder and South Dakota history, since 1997. Visitors get to drive a covered wagon, attend a one-room school session, and make corn cob dolls and jump ropes.


You've got to try.... Our new Prairie Bus tour at the Wilder Welcome Center. A few years ago, my family started a visitor welcome center on De Smet's main street. We offer a bus tour featuring sites in De Smet and throughout the countryside. It is a wonderful way to get off the beaten path and learn about Laura, farming, and the natural history of the area. All the drivers (I'm one of them) enjoy the opportunity to get to know our visitors.

Don't leave without seeing... The house that Pa Ingalls built on 3rd Street. It's the only building Charles built that still stands and visitors can see the kitchen cabinets he built for Ma. It's cool! Most visitors to De Smet know the Laura Ingalls Wilder Memorial Society in De Smet offers a chance to see the Surveyors' House from *By the Shores of Silver Lake* on their Historic Homes tour. Sometimes visitors skip the house on 3rd Street to save time, but they are missing out on so much.

Locals know...There is a lot to do and see in De Smet. A couple hours in not enough. Plan for the day, at least. An over night is great. De Smet has two motels, two bed and breakfasts, and campgrounds.

Take home... Photos and memories, as many as you can. However, if you are looking for a memento, our gift shop at the Ingalls Homestead has a fantastic selection of books. You could also pick up the iconic piece of Little House gear, a sunbonnet. I sew more than 500 every winter.

The best part of living here... The people and the sky. De Smet residents are genuinely friendly and progressive-minded. I'm amazed at how much happens in our little town. That said, the openness of the prairie allows for some impressive skyscapes. Sunrises and sunsets are gorgeous, a thunderstorm rolling in with a lightening show is impressive to watch, and the view of the Milky Way at night is an awesome, humbling experience.

A Place for All Seasons

A bout 20,000 years ago, the last in a series of glaciers moved across North America. As the glacier entered South Dakota from the northeast, it scoured and scraped the land leveling high places, filling in low areas, smoothing some surfaces and gouging others. The result is what is now known as South Dakota's Glacial Lakes.






Above: The Glacial Lakes offer prime opportunity for the enthusiastic angler. Left: Webster is the home of South Dakota's only pumpkin festival.








We Offer A Few General Birding Trail Tips:

Roads Be careful and slow down when driving on gravel roads, especially in wet or snowy conditions. A few of the trail's many gravel roads may be impassable when muddy or snow-covered. Check with local contacts if in doubt. Less -traveled gravel roads provide great birding.

Vehicle Trails Many of the trail's state game production areas (GPAs) and federal wildlife production areas (WPAs) have rough roads. It is recommended you walk rather than attempt to drive on these dirt roads. Please respect "No vehicles beyond this point" signs.

Multiple Use Although northeastern South Dakota has an abundance of public land, be aware of and considerate of others. Site contacts can provide

specific information about hunting or other activities at locations you plan to visit. **Weather** can change quickly in South Dakota. Be prepared with outerwear suitable to the season. Plan to include insect repellent for summer birding.

Parks An entrance license is required at all state parks and state recreation areas. All offer picnic areas and toilets. All except Sica Hollow offer camping. Most offer comfort stations with running water.

Don't Forget to watch for good places to pull over and bird as you drive between the trail hot spots. There are many such places. Set the brake before you exit your car.

Walleye remain the most popularly fished species on the Missouri River in South Dakota. Other popularly fished species in the reservoirs include sauger, northern pike, Chinook salmon and a variety of panfish.

If the abundant water and species aren't enough, the impressive scenery will complete your Missouri River fishing experience. You'll also enjoy facilities such as boat ramps, bait shops, marinas, resorts, campgrounds and restaurants that cater to anglers and their families.





BAGGING BIRDS, WATERFOUL AND BIG GAME

Hunting is a long-standing tradition along the Missouri River in central South Dakota. SOUTH DAKOTA TRIBAL LANDS

South Dakota's nine tribes invite you to visit their reservations and tribal lands. Rich in history and culture, these areas offer something for visitors of all ages. Enjoy colorful powwows, Native art markets, hunting and fishing, western events, tipi communities and hospitality at its finest.


Collectively known as Sioux, each of the allied bands within this nation spoke one of three dialects: Dakota, Lakota or Nakota. These terms have various meanings, depending on how they are used. They categorize and differentiate the general direction or area that each of the allied bands are located or originate.

Visitors can view and purchase authentic art and crafts at many locations. Tribal casinos provide gaming excitement and many powwows are open to the general public.

Native American communities contain a diversity of tribal members who practice varying degrees of tradition. Traditionalists expect tribal member and visitors alike to conduct themselves in a manner that is respectful of tribal religion and ceremonies. With this in mind, it must be recognized that a code of conduct practiced at one community or event may not be appropriate for another.

The ancestors of today's tribes left many artifacts and ruins behind. Resist the impulse to pick up souvenirs. Native American remains and artifacts are protected federally by the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act, which carries stiff penalties.

TIPS FOR BIRDING IN CENTRAL SOUTH DAKOTA

FINDING BIRDS

Timing is important in birding. Check your birding field guide and other references before embarking on a search for a specific species listed in the South Dakota Missouri River Tourism Birding Guide.

ROADS

Slow down when driving on gravel roads. Some gravel roads may be impassable when muddy or snow-covered. Check with local contacts if in doubt. Less-traveled gravel roads provide great birding. Watch for good places to pull over and bird as you drive between trail hot spots.

PARKS

All state parks and recreation areas require a park entrance license. All state parks offer parking and toilets. Most offer camping as well.

VEHICLE TRAILS

Many of the birding trail's state game production areas and federal waterfowl production areas have rough roads. It is recommended you walk rather than attempt to drive on these dirt roads. There are no fees required to visit these areas.

WEATHER


Air temperature and precipitation can change quickly in South Dakota. Be prepared with outerwear suitable to the season. Plan to include insect repellent for summer birding.

BIRDING ETHICS

The best birding is the least intrusive to birds and their habitat. Disturbing a bird — making it flush from cover, call in alarm or focus on your presence — stresses it



and may expose it to predators. Use binoculars, stay back, avoid damaging habitat and enjoy. The Great Lakes Tourism birding trail includes opportunities to view species with special protection from disturbance, such as the Least Tern, Piping Plover, Bald Eagle and Whooping Crane. Adhere to any signs indicating the presence of nesting terns and plovers or wintering bald eagles. Violating federal or state laws protecting these species can result in serious penalties in addition to the potential harm done to the nesting, migrating or wintering birds. (See American Birding Association's Code of Birding Ethics.)







TRAVEL

THE MISSOURI NATIONAL RECREATIONAL RIVER

The Missouri National Recreational River a unit of the National Park Service preserves two stretches of the Missouri River. It is a meandering, living river, forming much of the border between South Dakota and Nebraska; it is also part of nation's Wild and Scenic River system. Congress added the 59-mile reach between Gavins Point Dam and Ponca State Park in 1978 and the 39-mile reach, which includes the lower 20 miles of Niobrara River and the lower eight miles of Verdigre creek, between Ft. Randall Dam and Running Water in 1991.

In the 59 mile-reach the "Big Muddy" is vast, spectacular and unique, flowing fast past chalk bluffs, as high as 100 feet. The river valley is as wide as two miles in some laces, a testament to the twists and turns the river has taken over the last several thousand years. The presence of islands, bars, and chutes attest to the river's dynamic character.

The river in the 39-mile reach is thick with groves of willow and cotton wood trees growing on the banks and numerous islands and sandbars. Limestone bluffs tower

above the untamed river. The main channel twists and turns in gnarled braids from one shore to the other and the river flows more slowly. Native Cottonwood forests, tall and mixed grass prairies remnants and the river and tributaries themselves provide habitat for a myriad of species including several endangered and threatened species.

Missouri National Recreational River provides limitless opportunities to pursue outdoor activities within one of America's great historic settings, provides opportunities to pursue outdoor activities within one of America's great historic settings. The National Park has something for every visitor, boating, fishing, canoeing, camping, bird-watching, hunting, and visiting historic sites.





OUTDOOR PLEASURES

With more than 175 natural and man-made lakes and three major rivers gracing Southeast South Dakota, every day can be a new adventure. Public and private recreational facilities range from fully outfitted, up-scale complexes to charming rustic hideaways.

The Missouri River serves as a historical and cultural centerpiece of the region as well as an outdoor recreation mecca. Part of the "Wild and Scenic River" system, 98 miles of the Missouri is designated as The Missouri National Recreational River and offers canoeing, kayaking, boating, fishing, hunting, camping and more. Surrounded by picturesque bluffs, rolling hills and wooded wildlife areas, the 'Mighty Mo' is the major North American migratory waterfowl flyway, making it a favorite destination for bird lovers.

Lewis & Clark Recreation Area, west of Yankton, is one of South Dakota's top attractions complete with campgrounds, hiking, biking and horse trails, swimming beaches, marina, resort and much more.

Falls Park, in Sioux Falls, has a 5-story observation tower from which you can observe the majestic falls of the Big Sioux River as well as the city skyline. Six viewing areas, walkways and picnic areas, a restaurant, as well as the historical Horse Barn which is now home to the Stockyards Ag Experience, and Queen Bee Mill ruins, make Falls Park a must see.


Palisades State Park, located nearby at Garretson, offers several trails that twist and turn through Sioux quartzite formations along scenic Split Rock Creek. The more adventurous outdoorsman can make the climb to the top of towering quartzite spires.

Good Earth State Park, dedicated in 2013, is South Dakota's newest state park. Located just east of Sioux Falls, this National Historic Landmark is the largest Oneota cultural site discovered to date in the upper Midwest. It features 6 miles of trails through prairie, woodland and river bottom. A new Visitor Center opened in 2017.

The avid golfer will find top rated courses in Sioux Falls and other communities. High atop a bluff overlooking the Missouri River or on the peaceful rolling prairie, these courses will challenge your skill and refresh your spirit.

Recent renovations at the zoo include an entrance featuring Snow Monkeys and an expanded Bear Canyon exhibit. Children can make music, build, climb, dance and discover their inner artist at the Children's Museum of South Dakota in Brookings. Explore 40 antique-filled buildings and relive the days of an active turn of the century main street at Prairie Village in Madison. Visit DeSmet and tour two original homes and the homestead that Laura Ingalls Wilder wrote about in her book The Long Winter. The Dakota Territorial Museum and Cramer-Kenyon Heritage Home both offer a glimpse into the historic past of Yankton. See endangered fish species being hatched and raised at Gavins Point National Fish Hatchery & Aguarium, also in Yankton. Observe a live archeological dig in progress at Mitchell's Prehistoric Indian Village. Find butterflies flying freely year round at the Sioux Falls Butterfly House & Aquarium. Then go next door to The Outdoor Campus for free outdoor adventure. You'll find waterparks, watershows, family fun parks and more.

Don't miss the world's only Corn Palace in Mitchell,

decorated yearly with new murals made from thousands of bushels of corn, grains and native grasses. It has been newly renovated with color changing light up domes, an observation deck and fun activities for kids.

Communities invite you to celebrate and experience the rich heritage of the area at unique events and ethnic festivals. Enjoy an authentic German meal and a community theatrical production at Freeman's Schmeckfest, sample a homemade kolache (pronounced 'koe-lau-chee') and enter a polka dance-off at Tabor's Czech Days, or be a "Dane for a Day" and enjoy aebleskiver for breakfast at Viborg's Danish Days. Get your fill of kuchen (pronounced 'koo-ken'), "South Dakota's state dessert", at the Kuchen Festival in Delmont. CULTURAL HERITAGE AND THE ARTS

In addition to its wealth of outdoor recreation opportunities, Southeast South Dakota provides a wide array of cultural and entertainment facilities.

As the region's largest city, Sioux Falls offers a wide variety of historical museums, art galleries and theaters. Take in world-class entertainment including music, dance, opera and Broadway hits.

Ride the free trolley system, designed after streetcars operating in Sioux Falls in the early 1900s, from Falls Park to the Washington Pavilion of Arts and Science which houses a visual arts center, a hands-on science center, a performing arts center and the Wells Fargo CineDome with a 60-foot domed screen. Stop along the way at the Old Courthouse Museum, a grand 1800s quartzite courthouse with three floors of exhibits. Look for Trolley Stop banners throughout downtown Sioux Falls as well as at Falls Park. Tour the Pettigrew Home and Museum, the beautifully restored 1889 home of South Dakota's first senator, R.F. Pettigrew. The Center for Western Studies also offers a variety of history and art exhibits.

Discover outstanding works of art by Native American and other regional artists at the Dakota Discovery Museum and Carnegie Resource Center in Mitchell, Center for Western Studies and Washington Pavilion's Visual Arts Center in Sioux Falls, South Dakota Art Museum in Brookings and museums/galleries throughout the area.

Explore natural and cultural history at museums in Freeman, Madison, Mitchell, Sioux Falls, Vermillion and Yankton. These museums have preserved artifacts that showcase the rich Native American and pioneering history of this region.

A highlight for all music lovers is the National Music Museum in Vermillion, featuring musical instruments spanning five centuries from around the globe plus free lunch-time programs and evening concerts showcasing a variety of musical entertainment.

Mark your calendars for these area arts events: Wessington Springs Prairie Hills Art Show in June; Madison's Mart in the Park in July; Yankton Riverboat Days & Summer Arts Festival and the Sioux River Folk Festival at Newton Hills State Park in August; Art & Wine Walk in Downtown Sioux Falls in May and the Sidewalk Arts Festival in Sioux Falls each September.



Do you hear that? It's the sound of fresh air and sunshine calling. Following that call may mean leaving some creature comforts behind - for a little while at least. But don't worry, if sleeping in a tent isn't your cup of tea, we have full service campgrounds with electric hookups as well as air-conditioned camping cabins.

Lewis & Clark Recreation Area: Located near Yankton, this is one of the state's most popular camping areas. Situated on the banks of beautiful Lewis & Clark Lake and the Missouri River, the park offers many prime waterfront campsites and camping cabins, as well as resort facilities, several trails including a paved hiking and biking trail that follows the lake shore, equestrian campground and trail, disc golf, archery range, swimming beaches, a full service marina and restaurant.

2 SPRINGFIELD RECREATION AREA: A smaller and quieter park, Springfield Recreation Area is just upriver from Lewis & Clark Recreation Area. The park is located on the shores of the Missouri National Recreational River. You'll find great bass fishing and an adjacent golf course on bluffs overlooking the river.

REWTON HILLS STATE PARK: Newton Hills, near Canton, is a wooded oasis providing shaded campsites, a lookout tower and a fully equipped lodge, perfect for family gatherings. Lake Lakota boasts fishing, swimming and canoeing. You will also find hiking and biking trails as well as cross-country ski trails for winter fun. There is also an equestrian campground and trails.

UNION GROVE STATE PARK: Union Grove, near Beresford, has secluded campsites and features more than 180 species of trees and shrubs which provide impressive fall colors. Wildlife, including deer, wild turkeys, marmots, rabbits, fox and squirrels, thrives in the park. Over 200 species of birds visit the area, providing excellent bird watching. There is also a bridle trail and an equestrian campground with corrals.

PALISADES STATE PARK: Colorful quartzite cliffs along with a colorful past make Palisades, near Garretson, one of the most unique campgrounds in the area. Split Rock Creek, which flows through the park, is lined with Sioux quartzite formations that rise as much as 50 feet above the water. This park is popular with campers, hikers, rock climbers and canoers. A comfortable fully equipped lodge is perfect for family gatherings.

LAKE HERMAN STATE PARK: History and water-based recreation attract many campers to Lake Herman at Madison. Located on a peninsula, the park offers visitors spectacular views of Lake Herman. Melting glacial ice formed this 1,350-acre lake thousands of years ago. An 1871 log cabin built by some of the first settlers to the area has been restored. Visitors to the park can now play disc golf, hike, swim, fish, canoe or cross-country ski. Canoe and kayak rental is available.

WALKER'S POINT REC AREA: Tucked along the shore of Lake Madison, this small but complete park attracts campers and anglers. Campsites near the water offer picturesque views of the lake.

BIG SIOUX REC AREA: Located near Brandon, this park lies on the banks of the Big Sioux River with easy access to Sioux Falls. It is popular among campers, canoers and archers. Other activities include disc golf course, hiking and biking, and GPS trail. In the winter, cross-country skiers and snowmobilers gather in the warming house. An 1869 homestead cabin will interest history buffs.

LAKE VERMILLION REC AREA: Near Canistota, Lake Vermillion is popular among fishermen, boaters, canoers, swimmers and hunters. Canoe and kayak rental is available. The park provides the ideal hunting camp with waterfowl and upland game nearby.

10 STATE PARK LODGES: If you prefer all the comforts of home as you explore nature, the beautiful lodges located at Newton Hills and Palisades State Parks are just right for you. Lodges are fully equipped and perfect for larger groups.

1 CLAY COUNTY PARK & CAMPGROUND: Near Vermillion, this park encompasses 34 acres of vast beautiful wilderness on the last natural stretch of the Missouri River. It offers camping, picnic shelters, boat ramp, fishing dock and a paved nature trail.

12 TABOR LAKESIDE USE AREA: If you don't mind roughing it, this remote area offers a primitive camping experience with beautiful unspoiled views of the Missouri River. For boaters and fishermen, a boat ramp and dock are available.

13 ELK POINT CITY PARK CAMPGROUND: Conveniently located near Interstate 29, Elk Point's campground is situated in the beautifully landscaped city park and includes firepits, picnic tables, shelters, electric hook-ups and a bathhouse. The city swimming pool is nearby.

Take a trail to adventure. Experience the natural tranquil beauty that is Simply South Dakota. There are many ways to explore southeast South Dakota, including extensive trail systems throughout the region. Pick your favorite mode of transportation: bicycle, horseback, cross country skis, a snowmobile or your own two feet.

Guided hikes are available at our state parks or just bring your favorite bird, animal or plant book and chart your own course. Handicap accessible trails are located at Beaver Creek Nature Area and Big Sioux, Lewis & Clark and Pierson Ranch Recreation Areas.

Parks offering equestrian trails include Big Sioux and Lewis & Clark Recreation Areas, Newton Hills and Union Grove State Parks and Clay County Park. Lewis & Clark, Newton Hills and Union Grove also have camping facilities specially outfitted for horses and their riders.

GOOD EARTH STATE PARK AT BLOOD RUN: South Dakota's newest state park, Good Earth State Park, is located just east of Sioux Falls. This National Historic Landmark is the location of a large

Native American sacred site. It features 6 miles of hiking trails through prairie, shaded woodlands, ravines and along the banks of the Big Sioux River with three scenic decks along the trails and a new Visitor Center.

Pills' Woodland Trail, near Canton, is on the National Recreational Trails registry. It crosses dense basswood and oak forests, as well as open grasslands. There's also an eight mile multi-use trail, arboretum trail and great birdwatching. An observation tower offers a bird's eye view.

PALISADES STATE PARK & DEVIL'S GULCH: Trails twist and turn through scenic quartzite formations along Split Rock Creek at Palisades State Park, near Garretson. Sights along the trail include a bridge designated as a National Historic Structure. A challenging climb awaits the more adventurous on towering quartzite spires and sheer cliff walls. Devil's Gulch provides scenic trails to Devil's Falls and Devil's Stairway amidst legends of outlaw Jesse James.

ADAMS HOMESTEAD & NATURE PRESERVE: Trails at Adams Homestead & Nature Preserve, near North Sioux City, offer trails through native prairie grasses along the Missouri River, with wildlife viewing blinds along the way. Trails also meander through cottonwood groves and a century old

homestead complete with a home, barns, church and school house. Guided golf cart tours are available for those with physical disabilities.

SPIRIT MOUND: Stand where Lewis and Clark stood 200 years ago. Take the three-quarter mile trail to the summit of Spirit Mound, near Vermillion, overlooking 300 acres of restored prairie. Interpretive signs transform the hike into a learning experience.

BIG SIOUX RECREATION AREA & BEAVER CREEK NATURE AREA: Big Sioux Recreation Area lies on the banks of the Big Sioux River. Miles of trails ramble through woodland and prairie. Winter brings cross country skiers and snowmobilers to the trails. An 1870s cabin at Beaver Creek Nature Area, also near Brandon, is host to historic living history programs.

LEWIS & CLARK RECREATION AREA & MERIDIAN TRAILS: Lewis and Clark Recreation Area, near Yankton, has miles of trails including a paved

GEOCACHING IS

A TECHNO-TREASURE HUNT

Geocaching (pronounced "geo-cashing") is an outdoor treasure hunt using hand-held Global Positioning System (GPS) units. The geocachers hide and seek "treasures," which are found in waterproof containers and typically include a pencil, small notebook to serve as a logbook for finders and several trinkets like key chains, small toys and buttons. Geocaches can range in size from a small film canister to bigger than a 5-gallon bucket.

Geocachers hide the geocache and enter coordinates (latitude and longitude) on a website. Others download the coordinates, enter them into a GPS unit and hunt for the geocache.


Once the cache is found, the finders enter their names and date into the cache logbook. The finders can then take an object from the cache while leaving something of equal or higher value. The finders replace the geocache in the same place where they found it for future geocachers to find.

Geocaching is popular all across the state, particularly in South Dakota's State Parks including Adams Homestead & Nature Preserve, Lewis & Clark Recreation Area and Palisades State Park. These state parks also offer some hands-on learning opportunities. Caches are listed on www.gfp.sd.gov/to-do/geocaching/.

The area between Lennox and Menno has dozens of caches arranged to spell the word "GEOCACHING". You can also geocache the Oyate Trail across southern South Dakota and receive a special coin. There are 110 geocaches spaced approximately every 3 miles along the trail. The first 50 geocachers to find at least 100 caches along the trail are eligible for an Official Oyate Trail Geocaching Coin. To find these and other caches throughout the region and for more in depth how-to information, go to www.geocaching.com.

There are many types of geocaching. If you are a beginner, starting off with the traditional type described above is a good idea. Afterwards, you may progress to more complex types of geocaching. A multi-cache involves finding two or more locations. Most have a hint to find the second cache, and the second cache has a hint to the third, and so on. A mystery or puzzle cache may involve complicated puzzles that you will first need to solve to determine the coordinates. An Earth-Cache is a little more difficult. You have to identify some geologic feature, have your picture taken with it and then post the picture online.

Geocaching is an outdoor adventure the whole family can enjoy together. •



PALISADES STATE PARK:

ROCK CLIMBING

A small, but scenic geologic wonder, Palisades State Park is nestled among the sheer cliffs overlooking the Split Rock Creek just a short half-hour's drive from Sioux Falls. The park offers the regular menu of outdoor recreation opportunities, including camping, hiking and picnicking. But it also offers a unique form of outdoor excitement for the more adventuresome at heart.

Palisades is one of just a few premier rock climbing sites in the Midwest. Numerous climbing routes are easily accessed and provide a wide assortment of climbing experiences. Sioux quartzite formations play host to a variety of face and crack climbs, with even a few hidden bouldering sites thrown in for good measure. Whether top-roping a novice route on South Wall or Rattlesnake Rock, or a more ambitious route at Swing Set Cove or on Positron, climbers from all over the Midwest make the trek to Palisades to take on the forces of gravity.

When you think of rock climbing, you don't always have to venture out to the mountains. Sometimes a prairie oasis like Palisades State Park may offer more than meets the eye. And the views experienced while hanging from a rope fifty feet above the waters of Split Rock Creek are quite different than those experienced by other park visitors. It's all a matter of perspective!

The nearby city of Garretson, just two miles north of the park, provides all the services necessary for an extended visit. Palisades State Park is just 10 miles north of I-90 off Exit 406 near Brandon.

HUNTER'S PARADISE

Our state bird, the Chinese Ring-necked Pheasant, thrives in the habitat provided by Southeast South Dakota's landscape.

Thousands of hunters descend upon the southeast region of the state in the fall for their chance at the wily pheasant. Southeast South Dakota towns are just waiting to host your hunting trip. Hotels and restaurants gear up for the season with special menus and friendly people to make your stay enjoyable.

Hunting is a year-round sport in southeast South Dakota. Small game, waterfowl and big game dominate the fall hunting seasons. Predator hunting fills the winter months, and spring signals the start of turkey hunting. Though pheasant and deer are the most popular, hunters may find additional hunts for partridge, quail, dove, coyote and fox.

PHEASANT

Traditional season: Mid-October through early January. Season opens October 20, 2018. Preserve season: September through March.

Range and Habitat: Pheasants prefer agricultural fields, wooded draws, tree strips, wetlands and set-aside acres. Most of South Dakota is privately owned. Permission is required to hunt, but public lands such as Game Production Areas and Walk-In Areas offer choice habitat for pheasants. Early in the season, pheasants are scattered in small flocks, but winter's fury pushes birds into heavy cover and concentrates them. Tree strips, cattail sloughs and dense weed patches hold pheasants this time of year. Search for small, out-of-the-way pockets that may have escaped the hunting pressure of large groups. Small sloughs, plum thickets or even fence line vegetation hold pheasants. Prepare for the weather. Fall weather conditions range from 70 degrees to below zero wind chill.

DUCKS

Traditional Season: Late September to December.

Range and Habitat: More than 15 million ducks migrate annually through South Dakota. They include mallards, gadwall, pintails and teal. The migration peaks in mid-November along the Missouri River.

Nonresident waterfowl licenses are limited and issued by lottery drawing.

GEESE

Traditional Fall Season: September to December.

Range and Habitat: The Missouri River corridor is the main route for more than 400,000 migrating Canada geese, and eastern South Dakota attracts 350,000 snow- and blue-geese migrants.

EAST RIVER DEER

Traditional Season: Firearm, mid-late November to early December. Archery, late September to mid-January.

Range and Habitat: East of the Missouri River, deer

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RIVER RAMBLING

Our lakes and rivers offer pristine waters, picturesque scenery, historical sites and abundant wildlife. With more than 175 natural and man-made lakes and three major rivers, Southeast South Dakota is perfect for canoeing and kayaking. Paddlers can immerse themselves in the region's natural beauty.

Canoe and kayak outings can be combined with fishing, swimming, camping or hiking along the shoreline and can last for couple of hours or be a week-long adventure.

Identify all access areas and hazards before beginning. Sometimes portages are needed to get around dams, fences and sandbars. Always have a contingency plan to get off the river if weather or river/lake conditions change or a paddler becomes sick or tired.

Most shorelines in South Dakota are privately owned. Permission must be secured before going on the land. River sandbars may appear to be excellent camping sites, but water levels can rise quickly.

South Dakota law requires that non-motorized boats over 12 feet long, including canoes and kayaks, be

licensed in South Dakota or another state. The registration decal must be shown on each side of the bow. Every person in the watercraft must have an approved personal flotation device that fits properly, is readily available and in serviceable condition.

A list follows of some of the most popular waters for canoe and kayak excursions:

BIG SIOUX RIVER: With good water levels in the spring and early summer, it is possible to paddle from US 14 near Brookings to the river's confluence with the Missouri River. Paddlers favor the segment from Lien Park in Sioux Falls to Newton Hills State Park. Spring and summer are the best times to paddle this stretch of river. Points of interest along the way include the Big Sioux Recreation Area, Gitchie Manitou Park, the old Klondike Mills site and Newton Hills State Park. Both Big Sioux and Newton Hills have canoe launch sites and camping facilities where a park entrance license is required. Note, there are several low head dams where your watercraft must be portaged to the other side.

2 SPLIT ROCK CREEK: If you are a whitewater paddler, the high water flow in spring and the summer rains make the Split Rock Creek just the place for you. Winding through scenic northeastern Minnehaha County you'll eventually meet up with the Big Sioux River east of Sioux Falls. With an elevation drop of 130 feet in eight miles from the SD 11 access west of Garretson, through Palisades State Park, to the SD 11 access, north of Corson, there are stretches that can be hazardous for the inexperienced in white-water paddling. You'll find access points at Palisades State Park, right-of-ways that cross the river, as well as at McHardy Park in Brandon. The sheer walls of red quartzite that line portions of the creek provide a scenic trip for paddlers.

VERMILLION RIVER: From spring to fall the scenic Vermillion River can generally be paddled from Centerville south to the Missouri River. Access may be found at rights-of-way that cross the river. Colorful fall foliage is especially showy from Vermillion southward.

MISSOURI RIVER: Exploring the Missouri River by canoe or kayak is something you'll never forget. This river experience is not for the novice paddler. The Missouri is a big river that on windy days looks more like a large reservoir with white-capped waves that can

easily swamp a canoe. There are no rapids, but sunken sandbars, snags and other obstacles abound. The Missouri is 20 feet or more deep in places. Know your paddling ability and don't exceed it. Two segments are administered by the National Park Service as the Missouri National Recreational River. For more information, visit www.southeastsouthdakota.com/whatto-do/attractions/yankton/mnrr/.

JAMES RIVER: The James River is a prairie stream that meanders and curves. It has been called the longest unnavigable river in the world. Fortunately, this distinction doesn't apply to paddlers who travel the river in spring and early summer. You will find picturesque pastoral scenes as you follow this winding river. There are several access points near US and SD Highways.

LAKES TO PADDLE: Many South Dakota state parks have lakes that have easy access and are fun to paddle. These parks include Chief White Crane and Lewis and Clark Recreation Areas near Yankton, Lake Alvin near Harrisburg, Lake Herman State Park and Walkers Point Recreation Area near Madison, Lake Vermillion near Montrose and Newton Hills State Park near Canton. REEL IN THE FUN

Southeastern South Dakota has more than 175 fishing lakes ranging in size from three to 29,000 acres. Glacial lakes exist in this region in addition to numerous manmade lakes. Three major rivers course through the region: the Big Sioux River, James River and Missouri River, which includes Lewis and Clark Lake, a 30-milelong Missouri River reservoir.

This region welcomes fishermen year-round with open seasons on most species of fish. Along with private and city campgrounds, 10 state parks and recreation areas provide over 1,000 campsites to fishing visitors. A host of resorts and hotels are available for those who prefer the comforts of soft beds and cable TV.

The most fished species in this region includes walleye, northern pike, channel catfish, largemouth bass, small-mouth bass, bullhead, bluegill, perch and crappie.

Walleye and bass compete for top honors in this region. Lewis and Clark Lake, above Gavins Point Dam, draws anglers from across the nation for its alluring combination of largemouth and smallmouth bass. Backwater bays, sandbar drop-offs, creeks and stands of rushes provide habitat for both species. Walleye, sauger and catfish also make up the catches for Lewis and Clark anglers.

Panfishermen will want to look for shallow weed beds during the spring and drop-offs during the summer. Still-fishing with a small jig or fly fishing with wet flies or small poppers is effective for bluegills.

For young and old alike, nothing keeps fishing attention longer than bullheads. Good bullhead waters include most lakes and the Big Sioux and James Rivers.


Other popular fishing waters: Splitrock Creek, Marindahl Lake, Lake Madison, Lake Herman, Lake Mitchell, Lake Yankton, Vermillion Lake, Lake Alvin, McCook Lake, Lake Lakota and Lake Henry.

ACCESSIBLE FISHING DOCKS

Handicap accessible fishing docks have been installed in a number of state parks, including Lake Herman, Newton Hills, Lake Vermillion, Lake Alvin, Lewis & Clark and Springfield Recreation Areas. These docks feature low railings, accessible ramps, sidewalks and nearby parking.

FREE FISHING WEEKEND

South Dakota fishing waters, excluding tribal trust land, are open to anyone May 18-20, 2018 to fish without a license. This is an excellent opportunity to introduce

someone to the sport of fishing or try it for the first time.

PADDLEFISH

Paddlefish fishing is as unique as the prehistoric fish that is the quarry. Anglers interested in paddlefish have two options: a summer archery season or a fall snagging season. A limited number of licenses are available to both residents and nonresidents to either snag or use archery equipment to take one of these large fish between Gavins Point Dam and the Big Sioux River.

GAVINS POINT NATIONAL FISH HATCHERY AND AQUARIUM

Gavins Point National Fish Hatchery and Aquarium, near Yankton, raises the endangered pallid sturgeon and the paddlefish, which is a "species of concern" in many states. The fish are spawned and later released to increase or maintain fish populations in the wild. The pallid sturgeon is an ancient fish that can grow up to six feet long and weigh 85 pounds, with a lifespan of up to 100 years. Portions of the hatchery are open to the public. Guided group tours available by appointment.



ICE FISHING

South Dakota's fishing season never closes. Your annual license is good year-round. For the true sportsman with a warm disposition and a good down parka, ice fishing can be a great relief to cabin fever. You'll find plenty of frozen lakes to explore with good fishing all winter long. •

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lakeside trail, rugged mountain bike trails and a wooded hike up to a scenic overlook of the Missouri River. These trails connect with the Meridian Trails system in Yankton. The Meridian Bridge Trail crosses an historical double-decker bridge over the Missouri River that has been converted to a pedestrian bridge.

UNION GROVE STATE PARK: Union Grove, near Beresford, features a four mile multi-use trail and a large variety of trees which provide fall color and habitat for birds and wildlife.

URBAN TRAILS: Many towns have walking/biking trails that provide a relaxing escape to nature in the middle of the city. In Sioux Falls you can walk, jog or bike along the Big Sioux River from Falls Park to the Outdoor Campus. A five-story viewing tower provides a 360-degree view of Falls Park and the city skyline.

SNOWMOBILE TRAILS: Winter brings a blanket of white, along with opportunities offered by hundreds of miles of snowmobile trails



connecting Garretson, Dell Rapids, Brookings, Madison, Mitchell, DeSmet, Huron, Lennox and Parker. State parks that provide snowmobile trails are Big Sioux Recreation Area and Lewis & Clark Recreation Area. 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

Nonresidents may apply for a license if there are leftovers.


PRAIRIE TURKEY

Traditional Season: Spring firearm and archery, mid-April to mid-May. Fall prairie turkey, early October through January.

Range and Habitat: In the eastern portion of the state, turkeys prefer the woods and brushy hillsides of rivers, as well as tree belts.

Residents and nonresidents must apply for licenses.

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RETRACE THE STEPS OF

LEWIS & CLARK

The Corps of Discovery explored this area more than 200 years ago. Make discoveries of your own as you follow the trail through Southeast South Dakota.

AUG. 21, 1804 The Corps of Discovery enters present-day South Dakota. Here in the "Garden of Eden," food sources are plentiful. Joseph Fields shoots the party's first buffalo. Interpretive sign located at *Adams Homestead and Nature Preserve*, **North Sioux City**. See one of the last free flowing segments of the Missouri River.

AUG. 22, 1804 Following the death of Sgt. Floyd, Lewis and Clark needed a sergeant to replace him. Patrick Gass received 19 votes in the first election by U.S. citizens west of the Mississippi. An exhibit in **Elk Point** tells the story.

AUG. 25, 1804 The explorers hike to Spirit Mound. Area tribes believe that "little people" standing 18 inches

tall and carrying arrows inhabit the hill. Interpretive signs found at *Spirit Mound Historic Prairie*, 6 miles north of **Vermillion** on Hwy. 19, which features a 3/4 mile trail to the summit. 300 acres of prairie are being restored to original grasses and wildflowers.

AUG. 30, 1804 The expedition has its first council with the Yankton Sioux. The explorers present the Yanktons with gifts of tobacco, flags and medals. The Yanktons prepare a feast. Interpretive sign located at Lewis and Clark Recreation Area Welcome Center near Yankton. The Lewis and Clark Visitor Center is another great place to learn more about the expedition, the tribes they encountered and the Missouri River itself. It is located across the bridge over Gavins Point Dam.

SEPT. 2, 1806 On the return trip Lewis and Clark meet up with a group of Yankton Sioux, realize they are friends, and smoke several pipes together as they exchange news. Chief Standing Bear Bridge, near

Springfield, now spans the Missouri near the site of this meeting. A scenic lookout offers a spectacular view.

SEPT. 7, 1804 The Corps of Discovery sees their first prairie dogs, or as they call them, "barking squirrels." The party spends hours trying to catch one by pouring

water into its hole. They eventually manage to send a live prairie dog back to President Jefferson. Interpretive sign located at Fort Randall Dam Visitor Center in Pickstown, near Wagner.

SEPT. 11, 1804 After being separated from the party for over two weeks, Private George Shannon rejoins the keelboat. Shannon, the youngest member at age 19, had gotten lost on the prairie and run out of bullets. He went 12 days without food, except for wild grapes and a rabbit, which he shot using a piece of stick in place of a bullet. Interpretive sign located at Snake Creek Recreation Area near Platte.

SEPT. 16, 1804 The expedition sets up camp to dry their provisions following three days of rain. Interpretive sign located at the Lewis and Clark Information Center on I-90 at Chamberlain. Step out onto the keelboat-shaped balcony to photograph the river and its gentle bluffs. Exhibits inside depict items the explorers brought on their journey and wildlife the Corps encountered.

PART OF THE NATION'S WILD AND SCENIC RIVER SYSTEM

MISSOURI NATIONAL RECREATIONAL RIVER

The Missouri National Recreational River preserves two stretches of the Missouri River. It is a meandering, living river — no dams or channelization. Forming much of the border between South Dakota and Nebraska, it is also part of the nation's Wild and Scenic River system.

Congress added the 59-mile reach between Gavins Point Dam and Ponca State Park in 1978 and the 39-mile reach, which includes the lower 20 miles of the Niobrara River and the lower eight miles of Verdigre Creek, between Ft. Randall Dam and Running Water in 1991.

In the eastern reach the "Big Muddy" is vast, spectacular and unique, flowing fast past chalk bluffs, some as high as 100 feet. The river valley is as wide as two miles in some places, a testament to the twists and turns the river has taken over the last several thousand years.

Islands, bars, and chutes still attest to the river's dynamic character.

The river in the western reach is more than 20 feet deep, with thick groves of willow and cottonwood trees growing on numerous islands and sandbars. Limestone bluffs rise 250 feet over the untamed river. The main channel twists and turns in gnarled braids from one shore to the other, and the river flows slower, sometimes as slow as a lazy two miles per hour.

Native floodplain forests, tall and mixed grass prairie remnants, and the rivers and tributaries themselves provide habitat for several endangered and threatened bird and fish species.



THINGS TO SEE AND DO



can also camp, tour powerhouses and historic sites, birdwatch, visit a fish hatchery and aquarium, and explore quiet trails.

HISTORICAL POINTS OF INTEREST


The MNRR region can serve as a microcosm of the Lewis & Clark expedition. It is in this region they recorded their first impressions and descriptions of Plains Indians tribes. Their council with the Yankton Sioux demonstrated their diplomatic efforts. Clark drew maps of this part of the river. Joseph Fields killed the party's first bison near today's Burbank, SD. And the only death on the expedition occurred near the park.
